Puerto Cortez, May 7, via New Orleans, May 13.—Commander Fullam of the United States gunboat Marietta, has had another unpleasant experience with Central American administrative methods. This is the tampering with his official telegrams by a Honduran commander. Commander Fullam had given orders

that the American marines he with-drawn from San Pedro, one of the few interior towns to which American soldrawn from San Pedro, one of the few Interfor towns to which American sol-diery has been sent. On the day the troops were to leave, he learned that Manuelito Boulla, commandant at San Pedro, had been reading his telegrams and delaying their transmission until it suited him to forward them. Com-mander Fullam wired Provisional Pres-ident Davila, at Tegucigalpa, that he hoped it would not be necessary for the Americans to take possession of the Honduran telegraph lines to main-tain good order. Davila replied con-demning the San Pedro commandant's action, and later on wired the Ameri-can commander that it was a telegraph operator who delayed and supervised the messages without authority. The result was that instead of withdraw-ing the marines, Commander Fullam left them in the interior. They will, however, probably be withdrawn in a few days.
