### LOCAL BRIEFS.

R. W. Pittman has purchased R. S. Hamilton's residence at Fourth and J streets for \$5,000.

Anders M. Davidson, formerly of Sweden, has been admitted to citizenship by Judge Hall.

Eddie Williams, for 18 years a bartender in this city, died yesterday, at the age of 35, of Bright's disease. He leaves a wife and child.

W. A. Sherman has sold to D. C. Jackson the residence property at 731 east South Temple street, for \$25,000. Mr. Jackson will make it his home.

At tomorrow's session of the University Sunday school, Dr. James E. Talmage will discuss "Atonement." New outlines will be distributed, and those who desire additional copies of the old ones may secure them on application.

Niels P. Larsen has filed suit in the district court against Amy H. A. Thomas, administratrix of the estate of S. D. Hennefer, and eight other defendants to quiet title to 2 1/2 by 10 rods of lot 8, block 55, plat A, Salt Lake City survey.

Charles F. Carlson has been authorized by the consuls in the presidency of Liberia state to organize a singing class for children residing in that state. The class will meet Saturday, Nov. 5, in the Ninth ward annex, and parents are urged to send their children along.

Postmaster Thomas has received copies of a departmental booklet entitled "U. S. Postal Service: Domestic and Foreign Mail Matter," for free distribution at the Salt Lake office. The booklet containing information about the mails that will be of interest to the general public.

The Colgate Institute gave a rhetorical program yesterday, which was devoted to politics. Epitomes of the lives of the presidential and vice presidential candidates were given, with histories of the two great political parties. Two campaign speeches were made by Miss Ethel McMichael for the Democrats, and Clarence Hauxhurst for the Republicans.

Three cases of diphtheria and one additional case of smallpox were reported to the board of health yesterday afternoon. The diphtheria patients are Mrs. Taylor and her 13-year-old son, Percy, residing at 74 B street, and Robert Pace, aged 3 years, residing at 367 west Third North. The other smallpox case is that of Horace Bourne, 12 years of age, residing at 167 K street.

A fire alarm was turned in from the Main street area yesterday afternoon, but the blaze was quickly put out by the chemical before any great harm was done. The fire started in the kitchen of the hotel and was caused by the range sitting flat on the floor. Three firemen pried up some of the boards in the floor and found quite a little blaze, which they extinguished with the chemical.

Mary E. Hindlebacher has filed suit for divorce in the district court against Christian Hindlebacher on the grounds of desertion and failure to support. It is alleged that the parties were married at Bern, Switzerland, on July 18, 1880, and that defendant deserted his wife in July, 1899. Plaintiff asks that the home in which she lives be set apart to her in lieu of alimony.

A consignment of Moody Colportage books was received in this city yesterday afternoon from Chicago, for the Utah State Prison society of Christian Endeavor. The late Evangelist D. L. Moody left a special fund for supplying selected religious readings to inmates of penal institutions, and advantage has been taken of that by a number of the national committee of Prison Endeavor to send a large number of the little books, including quite a range of reading, to the Utah state prison.

The 1905 Normals of the state university gave the first of a series of dancing parties in the University assembly hall last evening. About 500 persons were present, the room was decorated, and punch was served in one of the corners, with music by the university orchestra. The chaperons were Mrs. J. T. Kinsbury, Mrs. W. M. Stewart, Mrs. Byron Cummings, Mrs. E. G. Gowan and Mrs. J. E. McKnight. The class committee was composed of Pearl Clark, Myrtle Gibson, Elsie J. Ward, H. F. Syndergaard and Moses Nelson.

Government Inspector Dorsey Ash has returned from Evanston where he went to inspect the excavation being made for the \$150,000 government building there, and will make occasional trips until a regular inspector is appointed to take station there. Evanston has only 2,500 inhabitants, so such a fine government building is regarded as something really gorgeous.

James Moore, Charles Wilson and George Taylor, three young boys with watering mouths for forbidden fruit, were arrested last evening about 7 o'clock by the police upon the charge of stealing about two bushels of apples from the city from near Murray. The three boys arrested and several others followed the wagon and sneaked the apples before the farmer knew what they were doing. Three of them followed the wagon up State street a little farther and were taken into custody by a policeman. They were released on their own recognizance, and will appear today for arraignment on the charge of incorrigibility.

Colonel S. B. Milner is in excellent spirits over the prospects of Twin Falls which he believes will before long be a larger city than Boise, and thus be the largest city in the state. Plans are maturing for a general development of the settlement along such lines, and there are also plans for a commercial use of the grand canal. This will include the operation of launches, tug boats and freight barges, so that merchandise, machinery and supplies can be shipped by water to various points along the line of the grand canal. The presence of the great reservoir lake will of itself tend to make Twin Falls a watering resort with facilities for both yachting and boating generally.
