LOCAL BRIEFS.

Conference in London.—Bishop F. S. Spalding will leave Monday for London to attend the decennial jubilee conference of Episcopal bishops. He is to be absent a month.

White Now a Captain.—George P. White, who was first lieutenant, and commanding officer of C troop, Ninth cavalry, seven years ago, at Fort Douglas, is now a captain in the Sixth cavalry, well up the list.

Display Ends Today.—The display of the sewing classes of the L. D. S. U. ends today, and the verdict of the many visitors who have inspected the work is one of surprise at the excellence, shown in the exhibit, which is held in the Lion House.

Alumni Banquet Wednesday.—The annual banquet of the high school alumni will be held in the gymnasium Wednesday, June 3, at which time the graduates will be guests of the association. Elaborate preparations have been made for the occasion.

Outing Postponed.—The Grand Army outing to Lagoon, planned for June 2, has been postponed until July 15, on which occasion Flag Day will be celebrated at the resort. The Dix-Logan post of Ogden, will join the local G. A. R. people at Lagoon on that date, and an elaborate program has been prepared.

May Revoke Charter.—According to reports from the shops, the wagon makers' strike in this city is not the places of the strikers filled. According to statements from union headquarters at Washington, the strike was without the shadow of an excuse, and the revocation of the charter of local 150 of this city is being considered.

Shane of Grand county has sent up from Green river to the offices of the state board of horticulture in this city a large quantity of apple, pear, peach and plum branches with advanced fruit thereon, showing that recent cold and wet weather has failed to affect unfavorably horticultural interests there.

Army Officers Leave.—Capt. John McA. Palmer of the Fifteenth Infantry, has gone to Petersburg, Va., on leave, on a visit preparatory to settling down at Fort Leavenworth in Kansas and cavalry school as an instructor on a four year's detail. Capt. Frank W. Rowell of the same regiment has been ordered to Fort Leavenworth for a regular course of instruction there.

Halloran the Host.—President W. J. Halloran of the Commercial club gave a luncheon yesterday at the club to the 33 children of the eighth grade pupils of the Bryant school and Miss Frost, the principal, and Miss Ferris, teacher of the grade. It was a very pleasant function much enjoyed by the children to whom a luncheon at the Commercial club was something to be remembered.

Death of J. S. Castleton.—Utah friends of John Samuel Castleton, of Lowellport, England, have received word of the death of that gentleman, who died from paralysis at his home, 19 Queen's Road, in the city named, May 1, 1908. Mr. Castleton has been a member of the Church since 1892, in which year he was baptized by his nephew, Frank M. Castleton of this city. He kept open house to the elders laboring in his vicinity. His wife was a devoted member of the Church.

Funeral of Mrs. Moyle.—The funeral of the late Mrs. Elizabeth M. Moyle, mother of Hon. J. H. Moyle, occurred at the Eighteenth ward chapel yesterday afternoon, and a large number of relatives and friends assembled to pay their last respects. The deceased was the principal of the Eighteenth ward, and the speakers were Elders Heber J. Grant, Edward H. Ashton, Nephil L. Morris and Bishop T. A. Clawson, several musical selections being rendered by Messrs. Pyper, Whitney, Eosign and Spencer. The grave was dedicated by Elder Hamilton G. Park.

Twenty Horses Killed.—The state board of health, through its veterinarian, has killed 20 horses in Emery and Carbon counties afflicted with glanders. Secretary Howey says the disease seems to have spread quite widely, aggravated by the policy of horse owners who have been concealing it, claiming their horses were healthy. The board at once when the first suggestions of glanders appear that immediate measures must be taken. If this is not done, the disease will result in extended losses to the owners themselves, and the surrounding country. Losses fall on owners as there is no state provision for indemnification.
