"Hazel Kirke."—The immense audience which assembled to witness the beautiful and pathetic play of "Hazel Kirke" last evening, were scarcely prepared, notwithstanding the flattering testimonials everywhere showered upon this drama, for the rich and complete realization which awaited them. The play, though of slender construction, was wonderfully upon the emotions, but it is a question whether it is the most effective of the dramatic merit of the play, or the excellent manner in which it is presented. We will say to both, for certainly the praise can be fairly divided between the author and the actors. Mr. C. W. Coudock, the veteran, capable, and charming actor, in his old-time brilliancy, "Dunstan Kirke," the play's villain, a noble hearted old father, is peculiarly in his line, and in his manner the very essence of the part. It does the heart good to see Coudock once more, especially in his fine impersonation. Scarcely second to his own is the fine acting of Miss "Doris Kirke," a very good actress, especially in strong emotional parts, such as the one under consideration. The audience was fairly overcome, "like Nobe" all pass, at intervals during the evening. The company is very good throughout. The drama was repeated this afternoon in a large house, and will be presented for the third and last time this evening.

COUNTY AND DISTRICT CONVENTIONS.

The County and District Conventions of the People's Party, announced to be held in the County Court House to-day, took place accordingly. The Salt Lake County Convention, composed of the delegates elected at the primary meetings held in the various precincts on Monday, the 18th inst., assembled at 11 a. m.  
A few minutes after the appointed time, Col. John R. Winder called the meeting to order and nominated as chairman pro tem. Hon. John T. Cairne. This gentleman was chosen by the unanimous vote of the delegates, after which B. Beckholt was elected temporary secretary. On motion of T. B. Lewis, a committee of five was appointed on credentials. These were T. B. Lewis, Henry McEwan, J. S. Rawlin, Francis Cope and Emmeline B. Wells. While they retired to examine the delegates' credentials, speeches were called for and made by Delegates Thos. Taylor, A. M. Munser, Theodore Angell, Royal Barney, Wm. J. Howells, John Kirkman, Thomas Gerrard, Peter Erickson, Richard Brimley, Jesse West, Wm. McLachlan, Thos. Taylor, D. Backholt, Elmina Taylor, Henry Dinwoodey, James Lawson, Joseph W. Summerhayes, Francis Cope, M. H. Peck, Wm. B. Deagall, A. W. Carlson, Robert Smith, Henry Arnold, John T. Cairne, T. B. Lewis, O. F. Whitley, James Sharp, Thos. E. Change, Wm. A. McMaster, Alexander McKee, Henry McEwan, J. R. Winder, J. E. Taylor, E. B. Wells, Samuel Mackay, M. A. Press, Iphigene Phillips, D. S. Rawlin, Thos. Howells, J. S. Rawlin, Richard Howe, A. Gardner, F. A. Cooper, Robert Pixon, W. C. Grump, Chas. C. Burnham, L. Smith, Isaac J. Wardle, A. L. Fuller, E. F. M. Gust, George B. Bailey and Elminah Eldridge.  
The report was accepted, and on motion of Joseph E. Taylor the assembly proceeded to a permanent organization. This was effected as follows: President, John T. The convention was then opened by prayer from the Chaplain.  
The chairman stated the objects of the meeting, the first of which was the nomination of County and Territorial officers to be voted for at the coming August election, and the second, the election of delegates to attend the Council District Convention and the Representative District Convention, to be held, consecutively after the adjournment of this meeting. The election call was then read by the clerk, and the following nominations were made:

Territorial Superintendent of District Schools—John Taylor.  
County Selectman, to fill the expired term of Samuel R. Beaman—Archibald Gardner.

Justice of the Peace—Sugar House Precinct, L. S. Clark; Constable, Martin Barnes.  
Constable Big Cottonwood Precinct, L. A. Howard.  
Justice of the Peace, Herriman Precinct, Henry Crane; Constable, Thos. Butterfield.  
On motion of Henry Dinwoodey, the following delegates were elected to represent Salt Lake County in the Council District Convention, and the Representative District Convention:

Little Cottonwood, Granite and Sandy—L. A. Howard.  
Dodge—L. Smith.  
Port Harrison, Riverton, South Jordan and Bingham—L. J. Wardle.  
West Jordan—F. A. Cooper.  
North Jordan, Granger, Brighton and Pleasant Green, Robert Pixon.  
The following were chosen delegates at large: E. B. Wells, John T. Cairne, Diana Reid, Mary A. Press, A. M. Munser, James Sharp, Elmina Taylor.  
The present incumbents of the County Central Committee, were selected and were dispersed to fill vacancies in nominations that have been made if any should occur between this and the day of election.  
The Convention then adjourned sine die.  
The following were chosen temporary chairman and A. M. Munser, temporary secretary. The following named were appointed a committee on credentials. Thos. Taylor, W. C. Grump, E. B. Wells, John T. Cairne and Philip De La Mar.  
They reported the following as entitled to seats in the convention: Salt Lake County—John Henry Smith, Hoses Stout, James Sharp, John Jaques, Charles W. Penrose.  
Morgan County—Samuel Francis. A District Central Committee was appointed to be composed of the Salt Lake County Central Committee, with two persons from Tooele County, two from Davis County and one from Morgan County.  
The Convention then adjourned sine die.
