German emigrants for Oregon—Fire-

insurance.

forwarding 50,000 German emigrants to

Oregon, to settle on the lands of the

with the new line which the N. P.

C. Co. will establish between Panama,

San Francisco and Portland, in opposi-

tion to the Pacific Mail Co. Passengers

from Bremen to Portland will be land-

ed for seventy dollars.
