Commercial Situation One Full Of Hope for Salt Lake Business Men.

NO PREMIUM ON CURRENCY

All Indications Point to Early Retirement of Cashiers Certificates-The Local Markets.

The complexion of local commercial conditions is of a very fair color, in view of the recent financial disturbances. In banking circles the situation is quiet and is likely to remain so until after January payment of interest and dividends which will amount to considerable. The New York situation continues to improve and the same may be said of the banks over the country generally, which are looking toward New York for their cue in the resumption of currency payments. So it w.l not be long before cashier's checks will be called in, and the currency now getting into circulation substituted. Some of the clearing house certificates in this city are being surrendered, and the securities taken up and retired. All indications are in the line of normal conditions. While there has been a premium on currency in the east, as high as 3 per cent, there has been none in Salt Lake. Banking men, however, consider that general business will not regain normal ad-

justment for some time. Prices of the metals are very low, and it will take time for them to regain stability. The difference between the clearing hous figures of today, and those of a year ago, continues very marked: as for instance, yesterday's clearings were nearly three-quarters of a million behind the figures of a year ago. Only it must be remembered that then padding the clearings with unpaid balances was in full swing; while now, balances are paid up as fast as they occur, leaving nothing over. The reform was one much de-sired. The Utah Savings Bank & Trust company is in its handsome new build-ing on south Main street. It is re-ported that the banking concern to oc-cupy the spacious two-story quarters in the Newhouse block, opposite the federal building, will be the Walker Bros. Banking company. San Francisco, Dec. 27 .- Interstate Commerce Commissioner Franklin K. Lane today began an investigation into the complaint filed with the commission against the Wells-Farge Express company by the California Commercial association, charging the express company with discrimination, express company with discrimination, concealing rates which had been filed with the interstate commerce commis-sion and other violations of the inter-state commerce law. The association is composed of about 30 wholesale and retail dry goods firms. The charges of discrimination are based upon the second of the overlaw commerce in

public. This complaint avers that it is a distinct violation of the interstate commerce act. In answer, the express company depublic

his all allegation made, and charges that the association resorted to sub-terfuge in order to extort unjust dis. trimination in its own favor, and based its refusal to grant quantity rates upon the shipment in question on the ground that while consigned to one consignes, was intended for more than a score

of firms. It was brought out by Commissioner It was brought out by commissioner It was brought out by Commissioner Lane that since the fire of April 18, 1905, it has required 75, 90 and even 120 days to get freight shippen from New York, which had forcen many merchants to ship by express in order to get their goods for seasons for which they were intended. Mr. Lane also elicited by his ques tions put to the witnesses that while freight rates averaged from to 2 to 3 cents a pound from New York to San Francisco, the express rate is from 8 to 20 cents a pound, according to the size of the shipment. It developed that in order to take advantage of the lowest express rate of 8 cents, made on shipments of 10,-000 to 20,000 pounds, a number of the local retail and wholesale merchants formed an association, which could not separately make such large shipments. The stores have been crowded all day, with people buying mostly small things, such as knick-knacks, all kinds of linen articles, art goods. paperties, gloves, umbrellas, canes, neck wear, candies, dress goods, etc. but not so much in the line of etc. but not so much in the line of furs, millinery or the more costly lines. The manager of one large de-partment store says that in any one of the three days preceding Christmas there was more business done than in the three days preceding the Christmas of 1906. of 1906.

Wholesale cloth-lers who have had their traveling men out for spring orders say that prior to the financial disturbances every re-tail dealer was ready to place normal orders. For Twenty-Four Years Was Reporter

Among the more important positions held by Mr. Davis were those of secretary of the United States legation at London, assistant secretary of state, agent for the United States government before the Geneva court of arbitration for the settlement of the Alabama claims, and judge of the United States court of claims. Mr. Davis was the author of a number of important works.

Investigation showed that only a few stocks and certificates had been unearthed by Receiver Cushing. They were mostly shares of Baining compa-nies whose value is problematical. Cushing said that they did not appear to be negotiable. It is said that the finding of the stocks will have no ef-fect on the prosecution of Brown and Bartnett, as they have not been ac-oused of the embezalement of the stocks unearthed today. The missing bends, valued at 265,090, have not yet been lo-cated. cated
