PERSONAL GOSSIP ABOUT CONGRESSMEN.

"Buero Buero" gives the following Congressional Gossip:
I am about to speak authoritatively that Thad. Stevens expects to die in the harness; also, that Judge Underwood is a Radical. Robeson Conkling is the best dressed man in Congress. Reverdy Johnson has more dignity in his make-up than any other member of the Senate. Thad. Stevens looks like a Methodist preacher. Impacher Ashley has had his hyperion locks combed. Judge Wilson, of Iowa, has grown gray in two years, and looks more like a Christian now than a boy. As he used to be Billy Williams or Indiana, has got a new pair of gold eye glasses, which he hasn't worn long enough to get accustomed to and consequently looks through them very awkwardly, although he wears them all the time. Thad. Stevens has lost most of his popularity during his recent European trip, but as usual, swings his hands and arms when he talks, very much like the fans

of a windmill. General Logan has had his hair cut, and looks very much like Zeb. Vance, late rebel Governor of N. Carolina. Speaker Colfax's tongue is set on a pivot in the middle of his mouth, so that he can talk faster than Barnum's calculator can cypher. Judge Rogers is, next to Speaker Colfax, the fastest talker in the world, and next to Cicero, whose mantle fell on his shoulders and slid off on the ground (nobody has picked it up, yet,) is the longest sentenced man that ever lived. People won't believe me when I say that Ross, of Illinois, is a joker, but say he tried to be one. Eldridge, of Wisconsin, never made a speech of more than ten minutes' duration in his life, and is one of the ablest Democrats in Congress. Marshall, of Illinois, is improving in health. Kelley, however, talks through his nose too much, and imitates Forrest in his style of declamation. He would make a first-class Jack Cade. Leonard Myers and Charles O'Neil, of Philadelphia, are close in their intimacy with each other as the Siamese twins. General Schenck and General Butler talk by jerk—as if they really believed what they said, and expected everybody to be convinced of the correctness of their views, the moment the word leaves their mouths. Butler wears a wide brimmed slouched hat, tilted on one side of his head with a rakish or brigandish air, while his make-up otherwise resembles a well-fed alderman.

Richard Weaver, the converted prize fighter and collier, is one of the most remarkable men in England. Before his conversion he was ignorant, brutal, and a terror to his neighborhood. His first act after his reformation was to drive a Bible van within the enclosure of a horse-race, and, taking off his coat and handkerchief, went to work selling Bibles and singing sacred songs, undaunted amid threats of personal violence, till he actually broke up the gambling booths and spread consternation among the revelers. Popular alike in the rural districts and in the cities, he can crowd the largest theatres, overflow the largest churches, and among the miners, colliers, and operatives in factories, he can count his audiences by thousands when he preaches in the fields.

A fire occurred in London a few weeks ago, at which an intrepid sailor named William Lyon, who was looking on, plunged into the burning building and rescued a woman who had fallen senseless from suffocation. The undaunted tar then heard that a child was in the second story, and again he darted into the blazing pile. He reached the second story, but the child had been taken out when the alarm was first given. Before he could group his way back the staircase took fire and fell. The flames pressed him more closely every second. He decided to take a flying leap from a second story window. He jumped, breaking his arm, and injuring his head so severely that for two weeks he lay delirious in a hospital. When his senses returned he found the London public had subscribed nearly \$4,000 to be handed him as a recognition of his heroism.
