So long as the smelting companies could be made to pay for real or al-leged damages attributed to smoke and fumes, the farmers and their business adherents seemed satisfied, but now that the smelting companies have be-come weary of the constant annoyance and litigation and are looking for new fields where they may carry on their business unmolested, it is different-with the farmers.

with the farmers. By the removal of the several plants at Murray, Bingham Junction and San-dy, the departure of 10,000 employes and their dependents is a foregone conclu-sion and the doom of the business interests in their respective settlements is sounded. The farmers, too, appred-ate now what the discontinuance of smelting operations in the valley means smelting operations in the valley means to them--viz., loss of a near-by and high-priced mark/st for their farm pro-ducts, and of a place of profitable em-ployment during the winter months. The question of maintaining the county institutions, without the taxes paid by the smelting companies, is also regard-ed as serious. d as serious.

The realization of these losses is now The realization of these losses is now a paramount consideration with all the valley settlers. Petitions signed by many business men and farmers, whose names appear in the original pe-titions for the granted injunction, are now being circulated throughout the valley. The petitions pray the feder-al court for an amelioration of the op-erative injunction. From the petition originating with the merchanis of Mur-ray we excerpt the following para-graph: graph That we did not, when we became

"That we did not, when we became parties in said suit, contemplate, ex-pect or desire, nor do we now dealre, that the right of injunction should be used with such effect as to require an approximately immediate shut-down or this important induiry, and thus dis-rupt business operations and unsettle and make all development, improve-ment and investment enterprises un-certain and even hazardous, jeopardiz-ing large property interests of Salt Lake county and creating a business stagnation."

Other paragraphs are to the effect that many of the original signers of the infunction petition "folned as par-ties to said suit with the impression and understanding that the principal object was to require the smelters to take care of their smoke and belleving that such a thing was possible." It is stated that all of the business, and more than three-fourths of the farm-ing interests will be represented in the several petitions; and it is anxiously hoped that, as a result, the injunction may be in fact dissolved by the court and that some thing in the nature of an arbitration committee representing smelting, business and farming inter-ests may be established with power to amicably adjudicate all differences in the future. the future.



U. S. Supreme Court Reverses Decision

Of Court of Appeals. Washington Jan 14.—The case of the St. Louis Mining company against the Montana Mining company, involving valuable lands in connection with the Druminamon lode in Montana, was decided by the supreme court of the United States today, the decision of the United States today. The decision of the vircuit court of appeals for the Ninth circuit heing reversed. The court is-sued an order endoining the St. Louis company from removing ore until the conclusion of the litigation.
