Confirmed.

NEW YORK, 30.—In the Episco-

pical convention, to-day, the Rev.

John T. Oriskany, of Pa., was con-

firmed as missionary bishop to

China.

Changes in the A. and P. Tele-

graph Company.

It is reported that John Duff has

sold his stock in the Atlantic and

Pacific Telegraph Company to the

Union Pacific Railway, and that he

has resigned as president of the

company; Mr. L. S. Morton has also

resigned as trustee in the A. and P.

Morse Arrests.

NEW JERSEY, 30.—The deputy

marshal, to-day, arrested in

St. Martin's parish, eight persons;

at the examination one was dis-

charged, two held under bonds of

six thousand dollars each, and the

others in one thousand dollars each.

Two men were arrested in Liberia

parish to-day. A number of rich

planters offer to make affidavit that

Commissioner Fiddell refused to

accept them as bondsmen for the

arrested men. There is considerable

indignation against the action of

the commissioner. Everything is quiet,

although there is some anxiety as

to the next steps that will be

taken.

Yellow Fever in Charleston—

Dead.

WASHINGTON, 30.—Col. J. Nos-

ses, commanding the first artillery,

writes to the Adjutant General of

the army, that owing to the preva-

lence of yellow fever in the city of

Charleston, S. C., he has removed

the troops under his command from

Charleston to Summerville.

Major J. R. Edle, of the ordnance

department, died last night.

The Safe Burglary Case.

In the safe burglary case, to-day,

Hayes resumed his testimony. On

the night of May 8th, witness re-

ceived instructions from Nettleship

to go and see Somerville about get-

ting Benton released from jail, in

Washington. Nettleship asked

witness to come on himself, and

make affidavit that he induced

Benton to come here and blow

the safe open by an arrangement

with Columbus Alexander.

Witness took the witness into his

office and produced from a drawer

an affidavit, and after reading it

witness signed it, but he decided.

At the request of Nettleship, he

called at Cunz's office on the mor-

ning following, and Cunz gave

witness four \$50 bills, saying, "Net-

tieship told me to give this to you."

Witness, with Wm. J. Daley, went to

Somerville's office. Somerville pro-

duced the affidavit, saying, "I've

altered a letter from Whiteley, in

which he asked me to sign it; the

witness signed and swore to it.

Next Sunday witness went to To-

ronto, under the direction of Net-

tieship, at eight dollars a day, and

travelled under an assumed name.

Nettieship also arrived and assum-

ed the name of King. The register

of the hotel in Toronto was pro-

duced and corroborated the witness'

statement. Nettleship wanted

witness to make another affidavit,

swearing that Carter got witness to

come on here and fix up the case,

and that Butts, another detective,

helped this. Nettleship said it

would place Carter where Benton

was, and Benton would be released.

Nettieship guaranteed witness \$10,-

000. On the same day Newcomb

arrived in Toronto, and showed

witness a letter from Whiteley, in

which he asked witness to go to

Boston, directing him to go to

Toronto to see witness, and try to

get him to return to Washington

and testify, and if he would not,

to get his deposit of \$10,000 re-

turned to Washington, testified, and

was afterwards arrested on a warrant

sworn out by Harrington. While

in jail, Harrington visited witness,

and said "I have nothing to do

with your quarrels with Whiteley or

Nettieship, but will show you the

way out. Riddle will call and see

you to-morrow. This ended the

direct examination of Hayes.
