WANTED TO KILL HIS SWEETHEART

Henry Ergman, Who Hails From Kansas, Threatened to Shoot Miss Evans.

JUDGE POWERS IN OGDEN.

Mrs. Mary Black, a Pioneer of '47 Called in Nineteenth Year—Weber Stake Academy Affairs.

Ogden, Nov. 3.—Because the girl he loved refused to receive his attentions, Henry Ergman, 25 years old, threatened to kill her and then himself. Ergman was arrested and now occupies a cell in the county jail. The young man came to Ogden from Kansas and has been employed by the Utah Light & Railway company for the past year. During this time he kept company with Miss Mamie Evans, a young woman several years his senior, who resides in Huntsville. Several days ago Miss Evans refused to let Ergman pay any further attentions to her. On Tuesday evening Ergman called at the Evans home and told the girl that unless she would marry him immediately he would blow her brains out and then take his own life. Miss Evans insisted some excuse to get out of the

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dilemma, and yesterday her father, Evan Evans, swore out a warrant for Ergman's arrest.

WORTHY PIONEER CALLED.
Mrs. Mary Black Closes Long and Eventful Career.
Ogden, Nov. 3.—Mrs. Mary Brown, formerly Mrs. Mary Black, one of the honored pioneers of 1847, died at her home in this city shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon of general debility, aged 90.
Mrs. Brown, who was widely known

throughout the county, came to Utah with the Mormon settlement in 1847, and one year later removed to this city, where she has resided since. She is survived by three children—George D. Black, Sugar City, Ida; Mary Leonard, Anaconda, and Mrs. H. J. Newman of Ogden. She is also survived by 62 grandchildren and 84 great grandchildren.

The funeral will be held Sunday at 2 p. m. in the Second ward meeting-house.

WEBER STAKE ACADEMY.

DEMOCRATIC RALLY.

Judge Powers Predicts Return of Liberal Regime if Republicans Win.

Provo, Nov. 3.—The Democrats held a great rally in the opera house last evening. Hon. T. N. Taylor acted as chairman.
Joseph A. Hyde was the first speaker. After giving some of the reasons why he was a Democrat, he urged the people to vote the Democratic ticket in order to relieve the state from the political conflict now existing and of which the conservative element in the state was getting tired.

Judge Powers was the main speaker at the evening. He spoke largely of local conditions, expressing regrets that he could not devote the time to discussing the political differences between the two great parties. He claimed that the Republican and the "American" parties were organized and organized on Church and anti-Church lines, and that the success of the Republican party would mean a return to the days of the Liberal and People's parties, with their

bitterness and strife existing in intensified degree.

The judge refuted the charge that he was insincere, that he would vote for the disfranchisement of the Mormon people, etc. "If there is an attempt to disfranchise the Mormon people," said the judge, "I will fight it whether in Congress or as a private citizen." He read from the Improvement Era an article signed by President Joseph P. Smith, which he alleged was being interpreted by the Republicans as directed against the Democratic party, and was being made use of as such by Republican politicians. Judge Powers did not think this was the intent of the article, if he did he would not hesitate to say it; but he called attention to the use that was being made of it to show the regrettable methods of the opponents of his party.

AMERICAN FORK. DEATH OF E. TATTERSOL.

Highly Respected Citizen Follows Son To The Grave.

American Fork, Utah Co., Nov. 2.—E. Tattersol, a highly respected citizen of American Fork, died here at 10 o'clock this morning, after a week's illness, of pneumonia. Two weeks ago his son Arthur met with a terrible accident in the sugar factory here and died a few days later, and the worry and exposure caused by this great grief was too much for Mr. Tattersol and he was stricken with pneumonia and passed away at the above named hour this morning. This, indeed, is a terrible blow to the bereaved widow and three children that survive him, as their grief seemed almost unbearable at the loss of their son and brother in so tragic a manner last week. They have the sympathy of the entire community in this their double bereavement.

Mr. Tattersol was an honest, hard-working, unassuming man, and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. He was about 60 years of age. He has a brother living at Park City, who was with him when he died. Arrangements for the funeral services have not yet been made.

BEAVER CITY. VETERAN OF 83 CALLED.

Beaver City, Beaver Co., Oct. 31.—Funeral services were held Sunday last over the remains of Mrs. Agnes Taylor, who died on Saturday, the 27th inst., of asthma. Mrs. Taylor was the daughter of Richard and Margaret McOwen Reid, and was born Sept. 25, 1823, in the parish of Glenelg, Scotland. She became a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in October, 1851, and came to America in 1857, arriving in Salt Lake City Sept. 15, 1859, where she married Isaiah Wakefield Taylor, Nov. 19, 1861. The family lived in Salt Lake City until 1868, when they moved to this city, and have made their home here since that time.

Mrs. Taylor was a widow for many years, was unobtrusive and of a retiring disposition, but ever studiously faithful in her allegiance to her adopted faith. She has left an enviable record of integrity; she has no relatives here. A nephew, James Reid, lives in Utah county.
