ATTEMPTS TO RECONCILE FAIL

There were five acts and many scenes at the Friday matinee in Judge Morse's court yesterday. Second in point of time, but first by odds in interest was the case of Farrer versus Farrer, and, in the opinion of the court, the case was far fetched. It was an attempt on the part of the plaintiff, Phoebe Farrer, to have her husband, William E. Farrer, adjudged guilty of contempt for not living up to a decree of the court signed May 6 last, requiring defendant to pay \$20 a month temporary alimony to his wife.

When both litigants had partly told their stories on the stand yesterday, attorneys on either side were astounded at the state of affairs that had developed in the Farrer household since the last previous round had been fought in the court. It was to the effect that Mr. and Mrs. Farrer had lived as husband and wife for months since the period stated, had rented their own home to others and removed to another place where they dwelt until a comparatively short time ago. The cause of their subsequent disagreement, which resulted in the husband leaving home was told differently by each. Mrs. Farrer testified that her husband had paid her about \$10 cash during September, and that the groceries he sent her were worth \$7.50. She swore that during the month stated he had furnished eatables to the amount of more than \$30, "no worse than customers get at the store," had given her a check for \$7.50, another for \$10 and 50 cents in cash besides. He spoke bitterly of his home life, saying that he was treated as an unnecessary appendage, except as a provider for his own and a host of others who swarmed at the house. ORDER IN KENZIE CASE

Half of the first amount was to enable the wife to come from Denver to oppose the husband's suit for divorce, and the other \$50 was for attorney's fees. Kenzie charged his wife with desertion. She filed a cross-complaint, alleging him of being false to his marriage vows by associating with other women. Defendant also alleged in her complaint that she is without means, and is suffering from extreme anxiety, and hope of recovery. Kenzie is a superintendent at Garfield, earning \$150 a month, his wife says. He swore upon the stand yesterday that he is getting \$35 a month, but admitted that he averaged \$1 a day nearly every day in the month. Of this sum \$55 a month, he said, went to the support of his mother and his 16-year-old daughter.

BARTLETT GIVEN DECREE

George Bartlett was granted a divorce from Tillie A. Bartlett, on the grounds of desertion. They were married Aug. 21, 1903, and the desertion took place in July, 1907. Mrs. Elizabeth Seward was granted a divorce from August Seward, worth \$50 as attorney's fee and \$15 a month permanent alimony. Desertion was the ground upon which the case was based, which occurred in March, 1907. The Seward woman to be divorced because of the desertion of her husband was Annie B. Zobel. This couple also was married in Germany, Nov. 9, 1902, and the husband is supposed to have returned to his native land.

UNIVERSITY NEWS

The department of physiology this year is one of the largest and best equipped in the university. One hundred twenty-five students are registered in the courses. Mr. John Z. Brown, A. B. '06, student in Rush Medical college for the past two summers, and Dr. Chamberlain's assistant for the past two years, is at the head.

The class in physiological chemistry has double the attendance it had last year, and is crowded to the limit of its capacity. This class is now studying the chemistry of the cell, with the egg and yeast.

The department is equipped with the best modern apparatus, up-to-date library, including American Journal of Physiology and other biological journals, which enable the students to keep in touch with the latest discoveries in biology.

Dr. Ross Anderson, head of the department of pathology, has recently reported to the American Medical Association, 15 cases of parasitic infections of the bowels. Up to this time no case of this nature has been known in the intermountain country.

Dr. Anderson has over a thousand specimens of pathological material, and is daily adding to his store. He has also been carrying on investigations of bacterial flora in the intestines of salt-water fish.

While on her vacation in the Green River country this summer, Miss Lorene Miles gathered a splendid collection of Indian relics, which she has generously donated to the museum. While visiting many of the ancient cave dwellings in that vicinity, the party found a skeleton and several trinkets, which they thought at first to be of antique origin, but later discoveries proved beyond doubt that the remains could not have been over sixty years in burial. The remains consisted of a skeleton, several silver rings and bracelets, stone tomahawks, arrow heads and saddle. The presence of the saddle proved the skeleton to belong to modern periods.

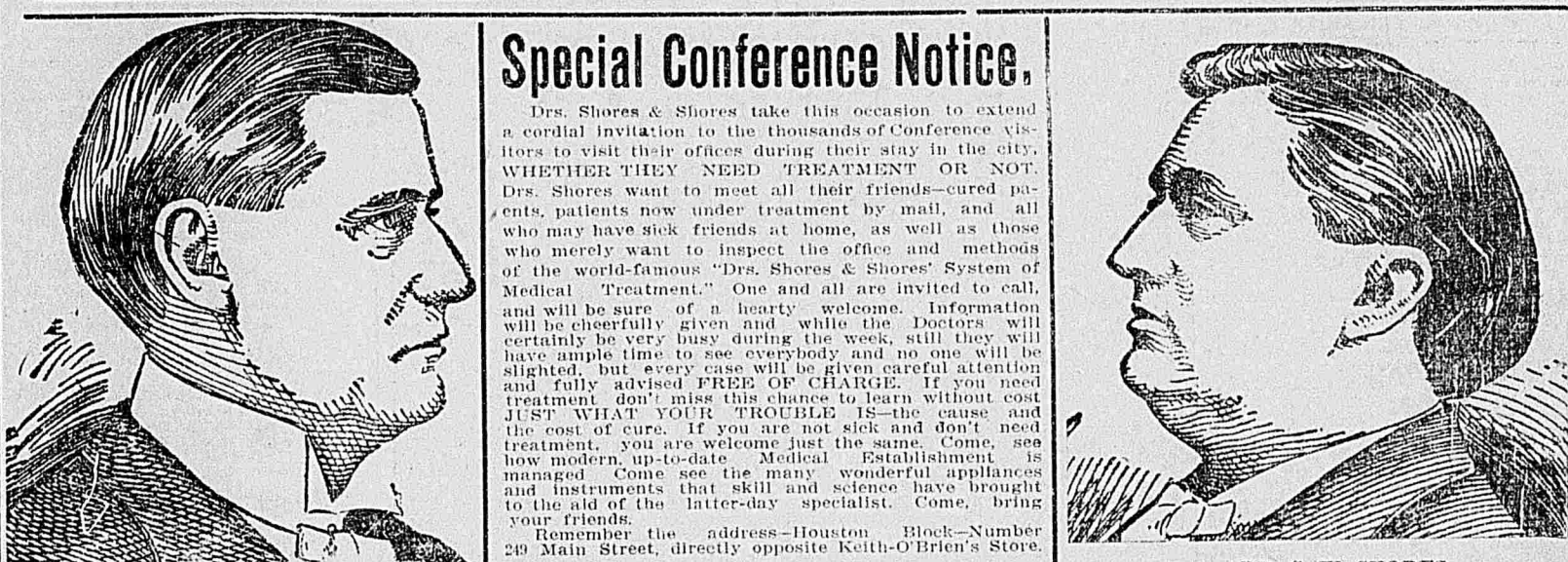
