ASTOUNDING CASE IN DIVORCE COURT

Remarkable Developments in Suit of Phoebe Farrer Against Husband.

ATTEMPTS TO RECONCILE FAIL

Wife Says Husband "Spoons" With Women of Different Complexions In Rear Room of Grocery Store.

There were five acts and many scenes at the Friday matinee in Judge Morse's court yesterday. Second in point of time, but first by odds in interest was the case of Farrer versus Farrer, and, in the opinion of the court, the case was far fetched. It was an attempt on the part of the plaintiff, Phoebe Farrer, to have her husband, William E. Farrer, adjudged guilty of contempt for not living up to a decree of the court signed May 6 last, requiring defendant to pay \$20 a month temporary alimony to his wife.

When both litigants nad partly told their stories on the stand yesterday, attorneys on either side were astounded at the state of affairs that had developed in the Farrer nousehold since the last previous round had been fought in the court. It was to the effect that Mr. and Mrs. Farrer had lived as husband and wife for months since the period stated, had rented their own home to there and removed to appear the results. to another place where they dwelt until a comparatively short time ago. The cause of their subsequent dis-agreement, which resulted in the hus-band leaving home was told differently by each. Mrs. Farrer said it was be-cause her husband insisted every day that she see her atterner and presscause her husband insisted every day that she see her attorney and press the divorce proceedings, while Mr. Farrer protested that it was because his wife made his life a burden by making false accusations against him. Every day, he said, he was accused of having entertained women in the rear of his store at 154 West Temple street. One day his wife would declare that a "blonde" had been there, and the next day she was equally posiand the next day she was equally positive that he had been making love to a "brunette." He finally took his daughter to the store each day, but still the charges were kept up by his wife, who contended that he sent the girl away at intervals while he "specific with women customers who "spooned" with women customers who came in at the rear dark.

REVELRY BY NIGHT.

Mrs. Farrer testified that her husband had paid her about \$10 cash durband had paid her about \$10 cash during September, and that the groceries he sent her were unfit for use. Farrer swore that during the month stated he had furnished eatables to the amount of more than \$30, "no worsa than customers got at the store," had given her a check for \$7.50, another for \$10 and 50 cents in cash besides. He spoke bitterly of his home life, saving that he was treated as an un-He spoke bitterly of his home life, saying that he was treated as an unnecessary appendage, except as a provider for his own and a host of others who swarmed at the house. When company was present, which was nearly all the time, he would be put to eat alone, and his sleep was disturbed by "sounds of revelry at night."

The court took the view that both parties had put themselves outside the pale of the court by their actions, but he declared that the present order would stand until the case could be heard, Nov. 12.

ORDER IN KENZIE CASE.

An order was made by Judge Morse that Charles M. Kenzle pay to his wife, Edith M. Kenzle, the sum of \$100 and \$20 a month temporary allmony. Half of the first amount was to enable the wife to come from Denver to oppose the

of the first amount was to entore the wife to come from Denver to oppose the husband's suit for divorce, and the other \$50 was for attorney's fees.

Kenzie charged his wife with desertion. She filed a cross-complaint, accusing him of being false to his marriage vows by associating with other women. Defendant also alleged in her complaint that she is without means, and is suffering from consumption with no hope of recovery. Kenzie is a superintendent at Garfield, earning \$150 a month, his wife says. He swore upon the stand yesterday that he is getting \$95 a month, but admitted that he averaged \$4 a day nearly every day in the month. Of this sum \$55 a month, he said, went to the support of his mother and his 16-year-old daughter.

BARTLETT GIVEN DECREE.

George Bartlett was granted a divorce from Tillie A. Bartlett, on the grounds of desertion. They were martied Aug. 21, 1903, and the desertion took place in July, 1907.

Mrs. Elizabeth Sieward was granted a divorce from August Sieward, with \$50 as attorney's fee and \$15 a month permanent alimony. Desertion was the ground upon which the case was based, which occurred in March, 1907. The Siewards were_married in Germany.

Another woman to be divorced because of the desertion of her husband was Annie B. Zobel. This couple also was married in Germany, Nov. 9, 1902, and the husband is supposed to have returned to his native land.
