But It Was Records Which Were Broken, Not Riders' Necks.

FINE PROGRAM THROUGHOUT.

Clarke and Mayer Lower Tandem Two-Mile Time and Clarke Reduces Three-Mile Figure.

From the start the knowing ones predicted that the Salt Lake track was going to be a fast one. The prediction was made good last evening for two records go glimmering. Clarke lowered the three-mile lap race by covering the distance in 5:49.3-5. Clark and Mayer lowered the two-mile tandem record, going in 3:57.3-5.

The former three-mile record was held by Iver Lawson. Lawson's record was made in Ogden, July 6, 1905. The old tandem record was made by Chapman and Lawson on the Salt Palace, July 10, 1901.

Taken all through the program at Salt Lake last evening was as good as any held this season. As was expected the tandem race was the feature of the card. Mayer and Clarke against Samuelson and Wilcox sounded good to the fans and they were not disappointed. The establishing of a new

record tells how this event was fought out. Every race was fast and full of ginger; the evening was warmer than any so far out at the lake and the crowd, being comfortable, was generous with applause.

## PORTLAND WOULDN'T JOIN NORTHWESTERN

Seattle, Wash., June 24.—The Northwestern baseball league directors, at a meeting here today, extended the franchises of every club in the league for five years. The clubs are Seattle, Aberdeen, Vancouver (B. C.), Spokane, Tacoma and Butte. The latter half of the season's schedule is reorganized in order to give Butte, which has been shut out of its home grounds on account of floods, more games at home and on the road. Vancouver is given one day longer in each series than under the old arrangements, as the jump is short.

The move of fixing the franchise term at five years means that Portland, in the Coast league, now dropped from consideration. For two years the Northwest league magnates have been waiting for Portland to leave the Coast league and come into its logical territory. There is no prospect of this now and all tentative moves to that end are abandoned.
