Harry Moss Makes a Good Witness for Himself-Mystery of The Fatal Knife.

COBBARD DIVORCE SETTLEMENT

Ogden, Utah, April 27 .- The scene of the murder of William E. Stone on June 10, 1904, in Ogden canyon was visited yesterday morning by the jurymen who are hearing the case, also by the district attorney and Judge Maglonis, who are prosecuting the case, and the defendant, Harry Moss and his attorney, H. H. Henderson, also paid a visit to the scene. The hearing of the case was resumed at 2 o'clock before Judge Howell and the jury.

The defendant, Harry Moss, took The defendant, Harry Moss, took the witness stand in his own behalf, and told a very straightforward story of the tragedy. He detailed going up the canyon in a buggy with Horace "Dick" Slater. That at the canyon resort they met James Hancock and Wm. Couley, with whom they took a drink in the saloon, then started for the dance hall, they had only gone a short distance from the saloon when witness encountered Stone who, without provocation, struck him a heavy plow ness encountered Stone who, without provocation, struck him a heavy plow staggering him, he believed the blow was struck with a sharp instrument as it cut his head open which bled profusely. At this juncture of the fight Mosa testified he got behind his pariner, Slater, and said: "I have had enough quit, I am no fighter, my fighting;" that Stone made a dash at fighting;" that Stone made a hash at witness and said "I'll get both of you," and again struck Mosa a heavy blow on the nose cutting open the flesh, witness said he then realized he was up against it, but he hadn't a knife and had not seen one up until then, but as Stone closed up on him they clinched Stone closed up on him they clinched and he, Moss, went to the ground, he then saw the knife, as with it he declared Stone slit his shirt holding it in his left hand. his left hand, Moss, succeeded in get-ting the knife out of Stone's hand and in swinging his hand around, must have at the deceased Stone, who was knew he saw Stone going towards the salcon holding his neck, from which the blood was flowing freely. He was dazed, and went over towards his buggy and with Slater came to Ogden and went to the Elite Cafe where they met Dr. Carnahan, who accom-panied him to his room in the Broom hotel where his cuts and pruises were dressed, and carly the next morning he was placed under arrest and then learned that young Stone was dead. In a severe cross examination he wavered but little from his direct testimony.

He was greatly honored and respected by the men there, and full military honors were accorded him at the Post. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the bereaved parents and friends.
