

DEATH WAS DUE TO NATURAL CAUSES.

Such is Opinion of Dr. David Starr
Jordan in the Case of Mrs.
Stanford.

SURFEIT OF UNSUITABLE FOOD.

Unusual Exposure at the Picnic, and
The Unaccustomed Exertion Were
Great Factors.

Honolulu, March 15.—The remains of Mrs. Jane Lathrop Stanford, who died at Meana hotel here on the night of Feb. 25, were escorted this morning from the undertaking establishment where they have lain since the morning following the death, to the Congressional Central Union church, where funeral services were conducted.

Bertha Berner and May Hunt, secretary and maid respectively to Mrs. Stanford, were present at the funeral, each in deep mourning garb. Miss Berner especially displayed intense grief.

At the conclusion of the services the funeral cortege proceeded to the wharf, and the remains were placed on board the steamer Alameda.

Miss Berner and Miss May Hunt were escorted on board the vessel by Deputy Sheriff Rawlins.

President Jordan and University Trustee Timothy Hopkins also followed the remains.

The following joint statement, signed by Dr. Jordan and Mr. Hopkins was left with Judge Smith, with instructions to release it after the sailing of the Alameda:

"In our judgment, after a careful consideration of all the facts brought to our knowledge, we are fully convinced that the death of Mrs. Stanford was not due to strychnine poisoning, nor to intentional wrong doing on the part of any one.

"We find in the statements of those who were with Mrs. Stanford in her last moments no evidence that any of the characteristic symptoms of strychnine poisoning were present.

"We think it probable that death was due to a combination of conditions and circumstances. Among these we may note, in connection with her advanced age, the unaccustomed exertion, the surfeit of unsuitable food, and the unusual exposure during the picnic to which she went on the day of her death.

"These conditions were perhaps somewhat aggravated by the presence of strychnine and other drugs in the medicine capsule and possibly also by the presence of the small amount of strychnine contained in the dose of bicarbonate of soda.

"The occurrence of this strychnine in the bicarbonate of soda has not yet been explained. The fact that it was not in excess of usual medicinal proportions suggests that its presence was due either to the error of a pharmacist or else that the preparation was prepared for toxic purposes.

"We must recognize that the preliminary hypothesis of accidental poisoning seemed a natural one under the extraordinary circumstances. We regard it, however, as being without foundation and wholly incompatible with the evidence in our possession.

"We cannot express in too high terms our appreciation of the generous sympathy and friendly hospitality shown by all the people of Hawaii with whom we have come in contact. We came to Honolulu on the saddest of errands and leave it with the warmest of feelings of gratitude toward this beautiful island, this generous-hearted city and its helpful and sympathetic citizens."

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MRS. CHADWICK AT HER HOME.

She Was Accompanied by Two
Deputy U. S. Marshals on
Her Visit.

WAS A TRYING ORDEAL FOR HER

On Entering Her Palatial Residence
She Broke Down and
Wept.

Cleveland, March 15.—Mrs. Chadwick, accompanied by two deputy United States marshals, left the county jail today in a closed carriage, and was driven to her old home for a farewell visit. With the exception of \$500 worth of personal effects, exempt from the claims of creditors, all of the furnishings and other personal property in the house will be sold at public auction by Trustee Lester next Friday.

Mrs. Chadwick was granted permission by Judge Taylor, of the federal court, to visit her home today to decide upon what property she would retain. It evidently was a trying ordeal for the convicted woman.

Immediately upon entering the sumptuously furnished residence she broke down and wept bitterly. It was her first visit to the home since last November, soon after which she left for New York. When Mrs. Chadwick had finally regained her composure, she began to select the property which she desired to keep.

She encountered Dr. Chadwick. Husband and wife at first merely smiled and nodded, and then in a formal way shook hands. On the subject of exchange, Dr. Chadwick had not seen his wife for two months when he last visited her at the jail.

Mrs. Chadwick selected between \$4,000 and \$5,000 worth of personal property, which she claimed was exempt under the statute. Almost all of this was wearing apparel, and Nathan Lester, trustee in bankruptcy, said that "she would protest each and every selection."

Dr. Lester said: "Mrs. Chadwick selected nearly every article for 25 women, which, in view of the way she has squandered her credit money, I consider very bad taste."

Before leaving the house Mrs. Chadwick again broke down and gave way to tears. She was allowed five minutes with her husband for a moment showed signs of affection or feeling for her. Replying to her statement that she knew that he was absolutely innocent of any charges against him, Dr. Chadwick said: "I hope you will be able to disprove the charges against you."

When the time came for her departure, Mrs. Chadwick was escorted to the carriage and returned to the jail.

MRS. WINNIE GUNN KILLS HER RANCH FOREMAN

Los Angeles, March 15.—Mrs. Winnie Gunn, a widow living five miles south of Whittier, shot and killed her ranch foreman, Eugene Vestal, in her bedroom at her residence last night.

According to the story of Mrs. Gunn, and corroborated by her 10-year-old daughter, who witnessed the shooting, Vestal entered the house last night in an intoxicated condition, after she and her daughter had retired for the night. He began to abuse the woman, and later entered the apartment and struck the daughter.

Mrs. Gunn procured a revolver and fired through the darkness in the direction of where Vestal stood. The bullet struck Vestal in the pit of the stomach. Gunn and her daughter then ran from the house, screaming for help, with Vestal following them. The latter ran but a short distance, falling to the ground, and died. The coroner's jury today exonerated Mrs. Gunn.

PANAMA CANAL COMMISSION PROVIDES LOTS OF POSITIONS

Washington, March 15.—The isthmian canal commission has approved the recommendation of the chief engineer for the creation of a large number of positions in connection with the prosecution of the canal work. In the office of the division engineer there are five positions, ranging from chief clerk at \$175 per month to clerk at \$100 per month. In the excavating department there are ten places from a supervisor at \$175 per month down to assistant timekeeper at \$75 per month, and in addition 20 complete stations show crews composed of an engineer, one crewman, one fireman and one pit man, whose salaries range from \$190 to \$75 per month. There are five officials in the mining department, from superintendent at \$250 per month to clerk at \$125 per month. In the track department 45 positions are provided for, including superintendent at \$250 per month, track supervisors at \$175, general foremen at \$150, foremen with salaries ranging from \$125 down to \$83.33 per month, and a clerical force of four persons, whose salaries range from \$125 to \$75 per month. For the transportation department there are 269 places, including a superintendent at \$250, two trainmasters at \$200, three general yard foremen at \$175, seven yardmasters at \$150, seven yardmasters at \$125, eight work train conductors at \$140 and 10 work train conductors at \$120 per month; 75 trainmen with salaries ranging from \$93.33 to \$60 per month, 20 locomotive engineers at \$125, 25 switchmen at \$115, 75 firemen at \$75 and 18 switchmen at \$100 per month, and a clerical force of three persons, at salaries ranging from \$125 to \$100 per month. Six positions are created in the camp and building department, ranging from a general foreman at \$150 per month to a clerk at \$83.33. There are 16 positions in the water department, at the head of which is a foreman at \$100 per month. The positions will be filled as far as possible by certification from the eligible lists of the civil service commission, but should these lists prove insufficient for furnishing the full quota of men desired, emergency appointments will be made without civil service examination.

Record Price for Exchange Seat.

New York, March 15.—Two seats on the New York stock exchange were sold today for \$33,000 each. This is a new high record price, exceeding the previous highest price, paid a few days ago, by \$500.

Nan Patterson's Trial April 10

New York, March 15.—Nan Patterson will be put on trial once more to answer a charge of murdering Caesar Atchison, the well-known bookmaker. This decision was reached today. The trial will begin April 10.

WOULD ANNEX SANTO DOMINGO.

Senator Heyburn Makes an Extended
Argument in Favor of
The Proposition.

DESTINY OF OTHER ISLANDS.

Declares it is to be Part of or Under
The Control of the United
States.

Washington, March 15.—Soon after the senate went into executive session today Senator Heyburn (Ida.) made an extended argument in favor of the annexation of Santo Domingo.

At the beginning of the last Congress Senator Heyburn introduced a resolution for annexation and supported it at that time in a speech. Today he declared that the destiny of this as well as other islands was to be a part of or under the control of the United States. He went into the history of Santo Domingo and cited previous efforts to acquire the island. Senator Heyburn favored the pending treaty because it was in the direction of annexation. During the day there were further conferences as to the disposition of the treaty.

It was positively asserted by the Democrats that there were not sufficient votes to ratify it, and the Republicans generally conceded that such was the situation. Quite a number of Republicans, mostly members of the committee on foreign relations, do not take kindly to the idea of abandoning the treaty at once and say they believe the debate should go on for some time. Other Republicans think that a vote should be taken and the responsibility for its defeat placed on the Democrats if they vote solidly against it.

After a recess Senator McCready of Kentucky made an argument against ratification of the treaty.

The idea which meets greatest approval now is that arrangements will be made by the senate to acquire during the recess of Congress all information concerning Santo Domingo affairs that the senate may desire, in order that it may pass upon the treaty in a way satisfactory to itself. When the senate shall convene next autumn with all the members present the treaty will be taken up and considered in the light of the developments at that time.

In view of this tacit understanding, it is quite probable the senate will adjourn tomorrow or Friday. It is known that several senators have made arrangements to leave Washington the latter part of this week.

After the president had discussed the situation of the treaty with the senators who had called at the White House, he had a conference with Secretary Hay and Secretary Taft. No details of the discussion were disclosed.
