Alleged Murder in Tooele County.-About the latter end of November, 1879, a young man named Charles Jensen somewhat mysterteriously disappeared from Rush Lake, Tooele County, and it has generally been supposed, inasmuch as nothing could be learned of his whereabouts, that he had been foully murdered. His friends had made every possible enquiry regarding the young man, and the fact of his absence was duly published in the newspapers of this city. In April last the Sheriff and Prosecuting Attorney and others of Tooele County took the matter in hand; but although testimony was obtained which rather confirmed the supposition that Jansen had been murdered, yet nothing definite could be done without first establishing the fact of his death, which was not accomplished until Saturday last the 15th inst.
