DESPERATE FIGHT WITH BANDITS.

Russian State Bank Robbers Cornered After Long Pursuit and Captured.

KILLED THREE, WOUNDED NINE

Seized Chief's Pistol, Shot Him, Barracaded Himself and Gave Battle To Pursuers.

Helsingfors, Finland, March 1 .- The pursuit of the bandits who last Monday night entered the Russian State bank here, killed the guardian and secured \$37,000, resulted today in another highly dramatic incident and cost four lives at Tammersfors, where two of the fugitives were cornered. One of the bandits got possession of the town hall and held it for hours, but finally was subdued by a stream of water directed by the firemen.

While Commissary of Police Balushin was examining the two captives, one of them grabbed a revolver from the belt of the chief of police and with it killed Balushin. The bandit then ran upstairs, where he barricaded himself in a room commanding the stairs and lobby and the street outside. Then he defied the police for three hours, meanwhile haranguing from the win-dows a crowd of thousands of persons, many of whom were in sympathy with

many of whom were in sympathy with his socialistic speeches.

A policeman who tried to pick off the desperado from a house opposite was killed by the bandit, who was an excellent marksman. After all other resources had been exhaustde, the firemen were called and poured a flood of water into the window. Simultaneously a band of police and firemen stormed ly a band of police and firemen stormed the stairs. One of the storming party was killed and nine wounded before the bandit, who fought desperately with a big knife, could be overpower-

The robber, who is a Dorpat black-smith, boasted of membership in the Baltic revolutionary committee, and said the robbery of the Russian State

said the robbery of the Russian State bank was committed to swell the revo-lutionary war fund. Six thousand dol-lars of the booty was recaptured. The population of Heisingfors is greatly excited, and in view of the pos-sibility of further crimes by the Baltic revolutionists, everybody is purchasing revolvers.

WHY LEATHER IS HIGH.

August H. Vogel Believes the Vegetarians Are Responsible.

Chicago, March 2 .- Vegetarians are largely responsible for the increasing price of shoe leather, is the belief of August H. Vogel of Milwaukee, who was the principal speaker last night at the semi-annual dinner of the Shoe and Leather Association of Chicago. He and other speakers complained that shoes in Chicago were sold too

"The world's visible supply of hides," said Mr. Vogel, "is every year becoming less in proportion to the increase in population. The hide industry is dependent on the consumption of meat. People are eating less meat than formerly. The consump-tion of cereal and vegetable foods is increasing every year and the price of leather is increasing proportionate-

There has been advance of shoe leather all along the line and it would be natural and legitimate for shoe dealers to ask for from 10 to 30 per tent more for their goods, but they don't except in the cheapest grades."

Postmaster Baker forwarded a city directory with a letter, saying that the directory contains 250,000 names and he was certain that this plan would afford everybody in Louisville a square deal.

ANARCHISTS TO HANG.

Minsk, March 3 .- Anna Izmailovich and Ivan Kulikhoff, principals in the plot to assassinate the governor, pre-fect and other high officials during a funeral at the cathedral, were yester-day condemned by a military court to be hanged, though their attempt had miscarried. A bomb was thrown and four shots were fired without re-suit. Anna Izmailovich is the daughter of a prominent general.

BERTHOLD LOWENTHAL DEAD.

Chicago, March 2.-Berthold Lowenthal, 76 years old, died yesterday. In 1870 he was elected president of the International Mutual Trust company, the name of which was changed in 1872 to the International bank, which office he filled until the bank was consolidated with the Continental National bank in 1898. He was president of the Chicago Sinal congregation for ten years and from 1870 to 1872 was president of the United States Hebrew charities.

WANT BILL DEFEATED.

Washington, March 2.-The territorial board of education of New Mexico and the Santa Fe board of education have petitioned Delegate Andrews to do all in his power to defeat the Littlefield bill preventing gambling in the territories. If the bill cannot be defeated they are anxious that it shall not go into effect until 1967, as schools in the territory are largely supported with fees from gambling licenses. These fees for 1963 have been paid in advance and must be refunded in case the bill becomes a law.

Nominations for Officers Closed, But Incumbents Promise Trouble.



To be told by maker or retailer that the food is "pure" is not satisfactory.

Candy may contain "pure" white clay or "pure dyes and yet be very harmful. or "pure dyes and yet be very harmful. Syrups may contain "pure" glucose and yet be quite digestible and even beneficial. Tomato catsup may contain a small amount of salicylic or boracic acid as a necessary preservative, which may agree with one and be harmful to another.

No government commission or officer has the right to fix "food standards" to define what the people shall and shall not eat, for what agrees with one may define what the people shall and shall not eat, for what agrees with one may not agree with another and such act would deprive the common citizen of his personal liberty. The remaining sections explain them-

A BILL

TO REQUIRE MANUFACTURERS AND SHIPPERS OF FOODS FOR INTERSTATE SHIPMENT TO LABEL SAID FOODS AND PRINT THE INGREDIENTS CONTAINED IN SUCH FOODS ON EACH PACKAGE THEREOF.

Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United ates of America in Congress assembled, That every person, firm or corporation engaged in the manufacture, preparation or compounding of food for human consumption, shall print in plain view on each package thereof made by or for them shipped from any state or territory, or the District of Columbia, a complete and accurate statement of all the ingredients thereof, defined by words in common use to describe said ingredients, together with the announcement that said statement is made by the authority of, and guaranteed to be accurate by, the makers of such food, and the name and complete address of the makers shall be affixed thereto; all printed in plain type of a size not less than that known as eight point, and in the English lan-

Sec. 2. That the covering of each and every package of manufactured, prepared or compounded foods shipped from any state, territory or the District of Columbia, when the food in said package shall have been taken from a covering supplied by or for the makers and re-covered by or for the sellers, shall bear upon its face or within its enclosure an accurate copy of the statement of ingredients and name of the makers which appeared upon the package or covering of said food as supplied by or for the makers thereof, printed in like manner as the statement of the makers was printed, and such statement shall also bear the name and address of the person, firm or corporation that re-

Sec. 3. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to purposely, wilfully and maliciously remove, alter, obliterate or destroy such statement of ingredients appearing on packages of food, as provided in the preceding sections, and any person or persons who shall violate this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars nor more than five hundred dollars, or imprisoned not less than one month nor more than six months, or both, in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 4, That the bureau of chemistry of the department of agriculture shall procure, or cause to be procured from retail dealers, and analyze, or cause to be analyzed or examined, chemically, microscopically, or otherwise, samples of all manufactured, prepared or compounded foods offered for sale in original, unbroken packages in the District of Columbia, in any territory, or in any state other than in which they shall have been respectively manufactured or otherwise produced, or from a foreign country, or intended for export to a foreign country. The secretary of agriculture shall make necessary rules and regulations for carrying out the provisions of this act, and is hereby authorized to employ such chemists, inspectors, clerks, laborers, and other employes, as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this act and to make such publication of the results of the examinations and analysis as he may deem proper. And any manufacturer, producer or dealer who shall refuse to supply, upon application and tender and full payment of the selling price samples of such articles of food to any person duly authorized by the secretary of agriculture to receive the same, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not exceeding one hundred dollars, or imprisoned not exceeding one hundred days, or both.

Sec. 5. That any person, firm or corporation who shall violate sections one and two of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not exceeding two hundled dollars for the first offense and for each subsequent offense not exceeding three hundred dollars or be imprisoned not exceeding one year, or both, in the discretion of the court,

Sec. 6. That any person, firm, or corporation, who shall wilfully, purposely or maliciously change or add to the ingredients of any food, make false charges, or incorrect analysis, with the purpose of subjecting the makers of such foods to fine or imprisonment under this act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not exceeding one thousand dollars nor less than three hundred dollars, or imprisoned for not less than thirty days nor more than one year, or both.

Sec. 7. That it shall be the duty of every district attorney to whom the secretary of agriculture shall report any violation of this act to cause proceedings to be commenced and presecuted without delay for the fines and penalties in such case provided.

Sec. 8. That this act shall not be con struck to interfere with commerce wholly internal in any state, nor with the exercise of their police powers by the several states, Sec. 9, That all acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are here-

Sec. 10. That this act shall be in force and effect from and after the first day of October, nineteen hundred and six,
