This morning Col. G. B. Squires re-cetved the following telegram from the chairman of Idaho's Republican party:

"Senator Borah left Wallace at \$ a. m. this morning. Can't reach Salt Lake before 6 o'clock Mouday afternoon. Ar-rangement as to hour of 4 o'clock can't be kept. I don't see how he can get there."
