

## CLEVER CROOK DOES NEAT WORK

Bored Hole Through Floor of Drug Store and Gets Away With \$50.

## THEFT CAREFULLY PLANNED

Robber Undoubtedly Took Measurements of Place and Timed the Trick to a Nicety.

Who robbed the Hoover drug store last night?

This is the question agitating the minds of detectives and patrolmen of the Salt Lake police force. The place was robbed last night by a clever crook who got away with \$50 in hard cold cash. The job was done by one who was thoroughly familiar with the interior of the store and its surroundings and one who also knew the hiding place of each day's receipts.

The store, of which D. B. Hoover is manager, is located at 201 west Second south street. Last midnight the store was closed after the receipts, amounting to \$50 had been concealed in a drawer in a case at the rear of the building. This morning when the place was opened the clerk was surprised to find a hole, large enough to admit the hand and arm of a man, in the floor directly under the case where the money was concealed. Opening the drawer he was given another surprise when he found the sack containing the money gone.

### BUILDING MEASURED.

The theft was at once reported to the police and detectives made an investigation. They found evidences showing that the clever thief knew where the money had been secreted; knew exactly in which case and drawer the \$50 had been placed; knew how to get under the building and make his way directly under the money. That the building had been carefully measured is the belief of the police as the hole in the floor was not six inches from the drawer.

### HOLE THROUGH FLOOR.

The thief had crawled under the building after the store was closed for the night, and with a brace and bit bored a hole large enough to admit a hand and arm. The rest was easy. Reaching through the hole the thief opened the drawer, took out the money and disappeared. The police claim they have no clue whatever as to the identity of the thief. The employees of the store are above suspicion but the trick was certainly turned by one who knew the dimensions of the building and the hiding place of the money. The rear of the building is not boarded to the ground and there is room for a man to crawl under the floor and work with a brace and bit.

The crook undoubtedly watched the place last night and when he saw the money placed in the drawer and the store closed up for the night he lost no time in getting to work. The time and place had been carefully calculated and it was an easy matter to reach the opening through the floor and reach the cash.

## FOR WELFARE OF SEAFARING MEN

Gather from All Parts of the World for a Conference in New York.

## FIRST OF KIND EVER HELD

Effort Will be Made to Solve Some of Problems With Which Sailors Have to Contend.

New York, Oct. 5.—From Almost every country in this world representatives have arrived in New York to attend a conference in the new institute for seamen.

The delegates came from 45 foreign stations of the American Seaman's Friend Society as well as from some organizations of Great Britain and other nations.

The conference will endeavor to solve some of the problems against which sailors have to contend the world over. This will be the first conference held and the present plans are to regularly organize and hold yearly meetings in the future.

Among the questions which will be considered at the conference will be the supply of good reading matter to the sailors, how to promote important and useful legislation in the interest of the sea faring classes, and the improvement of shipping methods in the ports of the world. Among those here for the conference are representatives from Portland, Oregon and Seattle, Washington.

On Wednesday afternoon the new \$25,000 institute building will be opened and dedicated. This institute for seamen is the largest and only one of its type of the world and offers all the features of a modern hotel. It will accommodate 200 men.

## REPUBLICANS TO ENTER A PROTEST

If there were a single party more than there are at present in Utah the voting machines owned in Salt Lake county would have to be thrown aside as inadequate to do their work, and the old paper ballot system resumed.

Seven tickets may be fitted into each machine for voting purposes. Seven tickets have been filed with the secretary of state for place in the machines. Of these the "American" party has filed three, two of them being considered the "Taft-Liberal" ticket and the Bryan-National ticket, in order to get votes for electors.

That the Taft-Liberal ticket will be allowed a place in the voting machines is very doubtful. At least it will not be allowed a place if the Republicans can help it. The law requires prompt action, and all day yesterday state committeemen of the Republican party were busy preparing a protest. It will probably be filed tomorrow, if approved by the committee which met to take up the matter today. In case this protest is unavailing, the Taft electors may decline to run on the ticket, and that would settle the matter. The law, as construed by the Republicans, concerning petitions to get tickets recognized, is meant to cover the cases of the people who have not already had a hearing at their party primaries and convention. Several party leaders doubt the right of the people who served as regular delegates at conventions where tickets were put up, to then sign petitions requesting that other competing tickets be recognized. The secretary of state must announce a decision on the protest within two days after it is filed, after which the only appeal is to the district court. The Democrats plan to leave the Bryan-National ticket unopposed.

### CONTRACT IS AWARDED

Architects Rutherford & Hansen have awarded the general contract for building the new Twelfth-Thirteenth ward meetinghouse to McCormick & Gray for \$40,000. The building being located on Second South street just west of the Lutheran church at Fourth East. The new structure will be 55x122 feet, of buff brick with Glencoe stone trimmings, having an auditorium capable of seating 40 people, class rooms accommodating 300 pupils. In the basement will be a commodious amusement hall. A feature of the main auditorium will be open archways at the sides whereby people can pass in and out without going through the center of the house to the rear. When completed this meetinghouse will be an architectural ornament to the city, and furnish just the accommodations that the saints of the combined wards most need and desire.

## IS FOR THE ENSUING YEAR

Will Appoint Committees on Reclamation Congress in Mexico and on Advisability of Commission.

El Paso, Tex., Oct. 5.—George E. Barstow, new president of the national irrigation congress, today announced the appointment of the following board of governors for the ensuing year:

President Barstow, Secy. B. A. Fowler of Arizona; W. A. Beard, California; Fred Kiesel, Utah; Dr. W. J. McGhee, secretary of the inland waterways commission, and Senator Joseph M. Dixon of Montana. If Congress man William A. Reeder of Kansas will consent to serve he will be the seventh member.

President Barstow yet has to name committees of five each on a Pan-American reclamation congress in Mexico City in 1911 suggested by President Roosevelt and John Barrett director of the bureau of American republics and on the advisability of holding a congress on national conservation in Washington in 1910 to furnish data to the national conservation commission, and another committee to furnish irrigation data to Congress.

## COWARDLY ACTION

This Is Hon. J. H. Sweetser of Burley Characterizes Tribune Article On Idaho Supreme Court.

That all intelligent people of Idaho as well as Utah will join in resounding the uncalled for and stupid attack on the supreme court of a neighboring state, printed in the Salt Lake Tribune

of Saturday last, is the opinion of J. H. Sweetser of Burley, Idaho, Republican candidate for lieutenant governor of Idaho, who is in Salt Lake for a brief visit, and is registered at the Kenyon hotel.

"Personally I consider the article a silly perversion of well established facts," said Mr. Sweetser, "and it shows not the slightest acquaintance with the matter it attempted to treat."

"It claims in brief that the chief justice of the supreme court, in making the decision, rendered it for a ticket having no opponent against himself, ruling out one that listed such an opponent."

"The Tribune took its data evidently from the Idaho Schmittar. Any judge in Idaho will declare that the state supreme court rendered the only decision possible in consideration of the facts. Chief Justice Alshie has lived all his life above such cowardly attack as the Tribune made upon his honor, and the general public in Idaho think too much of him not to resent such an infamous attack."

Besides Mr. Sweetser of the Idaho politicians, Robert Lanslin, Republican candidate for secretary of state in Idaho, is in Salt Lake, registered at the Wilson.

What Messrs. Nelson and Langford saw in the east they will think over during the winter and map out their plans with a view to introducing as many new features as possible next summer. Additional bathing suits will be purchased this fall.
