However successful he may be in eluding the law, by his immense cunning, his idea of men and women are by his own admission exceedingly loose, and it is a notorious fact that owners of stock on the range do not feel that their property is safe while he and his associates are around loose. Thieves.—While the people of the City are somewhat exercised over recent burglaries and outrages, the people of the country and stockowners in the City also are troubled over the immense horse and cattle stealing operations which are going on all over the Territory. Besides numerous comparatively petty general horse and cattle robberies, there are strong reasons for believing that there are at least two distinctive large organized bands of cattle thieves who carry on a regular systematized business of stealing animals in this Territory and taking them to and selling them in other States and Territories. A well known legal gentleman made a remark, in our hearing the other day, to the effect that there never was at any time so much cattle and horse stealing in Utah as now, and that it was being carried on to a greater extent here than in any other part of the continent of America in proportion to the extent of Utah.
