A cablegram from London, to the New York Snn, dated August 5th, is as follows:

A Mr. Shupira, of Jerusalem, bookseller and dealer in antiquaries, has just deposited in the British Museum 15 alips of black sheepskin leather, on which are written, in characters similar to those on the celebrated Mosbite stone, portions of the book of Deuteronomy, differing materially from the received version. The date of the slips is the ninth century before Christ, or six-teen centuries older than any au-

teen centuries older than any au then tic manuscript of any part of the Old Testament. Mr. Shupirs bought tham from an Arab, and he asks for them \$5,000,000 from the British Museum. If genuine, the interest and importance of the dis-covery cannot be overrated, and so far as the variations in secret text are concerned, there is promise of one of the greatest controversies that scholars have ever entered up on.
