WOMEN CALMLY FACE DEATH IN CEARENCE WRECK.

That women can be brave in the very teeth of death, and confronted by peril hold themselves well in hand despite the delicately tuned nerves inseparable from the sex, received further confirmation in the wreck of the British steamship Cearence, which after staggering for nearly forty-eight hours through an atmospheric mesh of fog. snow squalls and hail, laid herself witha thud and a crunch on the New Jersey sands thirty miles south of Atlantic City early in the morning of March 17.

For two days before the wreck occurred the ship had been creeping through thick weather, running at half speed. This together with the fact that Captain William A. Mason, who commanded the ship, ordered all his offcers to take their watches above decks filled the passengers with alarm, and when the ship struck a panic ensued among the thirty-nine passengers. Among these were nearly a dozen women some of whom wept while others prayed. After a time however the optimistic assurances of the ship's officers had the effect of calming them and although the rollers were boiling across the vessel's deck in racing squadrons they adjusted the life jackets furnished them without manifesting any further symptoms of fear.

The storm abated somewhat in the afternoon. A life boat from the shore put out to the ship and after perilous maneuvres all the passengers were safely transferred to shore. It took six trips to land them.

The passengers were lowered into the lifeboat in cradles made of lines and blankets, each human burden being deposited in the boat as the little craft rose by the ship's side on the crest of a wave. The surfmen reached out to poise each swaying burden and guide it safely into the well of the surf boat. This ordeal the women met with heroic grace, and upon the safe arrival of all on shore the male passengers were loud in their praise of the women for their courage.

The Cearence cleared from Brazilian ports with a cargo of rubber, sugar and general merchandise valued at \$1.000.000.
