A strong east wind blew vesterday norning bringing back with it a sec tion of the storm area that had just passed the valley. The present wet spell is causing anx-lety among the farmers of Utan and husho who are in the midst of getting in their crops. This is particularly true of the beet fields, which are so muddy as to make it impossible to haul the beets to the factories. If there is no cessation of the rains, and the roads continue soft, many farmers will dig their beets and pile them on the s... in the fields, as they will not suffer from frost, but might be seriously d... aged if frozen in the ground. The sup-ply of beets at all the factories of the three companies except that at Sugar City, is running low, and if the deliv-ery does not pick up in the next three or four days, several of the plants will have to shut down temporarily. The storm over this section has caus-ed rain or snow over portions of Utah, Nevada, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, British Columbia, Wyoming, Colorado, the Dakotas, Arizona, New Mexico, Ok-lahoma, Texas, Kansas and Nebraska.
