**RUSSIANS EXPECT BIG BATTLE SOON.**

Week of Skirmishing Around Siu Yen Retarded Gen. Kuroki's Operations.

### THE OBJECT OF THE JAPANESE

To Drive Enemy Out of Liao Tung Peninsula Preparatory to March On Liao Yang.

St. Petersburg, June 22 .- The imminence of a battle in the northern part of the Liao Tung peninsula is admitted by the war office and is indicated succinctly in today's dispatches from the Associated Press correspon cents at Liao Yang, Kai Ping and other plonts on the railroad.

The week of skirmishing around Slu Yon retarded Gen. Kurokl's operations, permitting Gen. Stakelberg to reach Kai Ping, the rear guard slowly falling back on the Senuchen before the Japanese advance.

Meanwhile large forces are hurry

ing south from Liso Yang to check both Gen, Oku and Gen, Kuroki. It is believed here that Gen, Kuro-

It is believed here that Gen. Kuro-patkin's object is to prevent a juncture of the Japanese armies. On the other hand, the aim of the Japanese appar-ently is to drive the Russians out of the Liao Tung periosula preparatory to a march on Liao Tang. The approach of the rainy season will more than like-ity precipitate matters. Nothing is known officially of the reported occupation of Halung Yai Cheng (Hai Ung Yao Chenz or Si Young Cheng) by the Japanese. If the report should be correct it agrees submanially with the Japanese out-posts are further forward than Rus-sian advices indicate.

### SEA FIGHT IMMINENT.

St. Petersburg, June 22, 6:20 p. m.-It is not betraying Vice Admiral Skrydloff's plans to say that important naval developments are imminent in the far cast,

The latest dispatch from Rear Admiral Withoft, in command of the navail forces at Port Arthur, dated June 17, reports all well there. The British ambassador, Sir Charles Hardinge, is not presenting a protest against the seizure of the British col-ller Ajlanton by the Russian Vladivo-stok squadron, in view of the Russian declaration that coul is contraband of war and owing to the Irregularity of war and owing to the irregularity of the ship's papers.

### ADVANCE OF JAPANESE SLOW.

Chefoo, June 22, 6 p. m .- While the Chefoo, June 22, 6 p. m.—While the Jupanese are keeping a close watch on Port Arthur, both from the land and sea, their advance toward the fortcess is not being pushed so vigorously as during the carly days of June. Chinese arriving from points on the Liao Tung penhasia say that firing is not heard as frequently. They report, however, that skirmishes, the result of which they do not know, occurred on the 14th, 13th and 20th of June.
