

RUSSIANS EXPECT BIG BATTLE SOON.

Week of Skirmishing Around Siu
Yen Retarded Gen. Kuroki's
Operations.

THE OBJECT OF THE JAPANESE

To Drive Enemy Out of Liao Tung
Peninsula Preparatory to March
on Liao Yang.

St. Petersburg, June 22.—The imminence of a battle in the northern part of the Liao Tung peninsula is admitted by the war office and is indicated succinctly in today's dispatches from the Associated Press correspondents at Liao Yang, Kai Ping and other points on the railroad.

The week of skirmishing around Siu Yen retarded Gen. Kuroki's operations, permitting Gen. Stahlberg to reach Kai Ping, the rear guard slowly falling back on the Senchen before the Japanese advance.

Meanwhile large forces are hurrying south from Liao Yang to check both Gen. Oku and Gen. Kuroki. It is believed here that Gen. Kuroki's object is to prevent a junction of the Japanese armies. On the other hand, the aim of the Japanese apparently is to drive the Russians out of the Liao Tung peninsula preparatory to a march on Liao Yang. The approach of the rainy season will move them likely precipitate matters.

Nothing is known officially of the reported occurrence at Hailang, Yai Cheng (Hsi Ung Yao Cheng or Si Young Cheng) by the Japanese. If the report should be correct it agrees substantially with the Japanese view of advance as it is understood here, but it indicates that the Japanese outposts are further forward than Russian advance.

SEA FIGHT IMMINENT.
St. Petersburg, June 22, 6:20 p. m.—It is not betraying Vice Admiral Skrydlev's plans to say that important naval developments are imminent in the far east.

The admiralty has no news of the reported loss of two Russian torpedo boat destroyers off Port Arthur. The latest dispatch from Rear Admiral Witthoff, in command of the naval forces at Port Arthur, dated June 17, reports all well there.

The British ambassador, Sir Charles Hardinge, is not presenting a protest against the seizure of the Russian Vladivostok squadron, in view of the Russian declaration that coal is contraband of war and owing to the irregularity of the ship's papers.

ADVANCE OF JAPANESE SLOW.

Chefoo, June 22, 6 p. m.—While the Japanese are keeping a close watch on Port Arthur, both from the land and sea, their advance toward the fortress is not being pushed so vigorously as during the early days of June. Chinese arriving from points on the Liao Tung peninsula say that firing is not heard as frequently. They report, however, that skirmishes, the result of which they do not know, occurred on the 14th, 15th and 20th of June.

U. S. SHIPBUILDING CO.

Ira E. Wood Brings Suit to be
Made a Party Defendant.

Trenton, N. J., June 22.—Ira E. Wood of New York, a holder of \$200,000 par value of the bonds of the United States Shipbuilding company, today instituted proceedings in the United States circuit court for the purpose of having himself admitted as a party defendant in the suit brought by the Mercantile Trust company of New York as trustee to foreclose a \$100,000 mortgage on the property of the shipbuilding company. Judge Lansing made an order to show cause returnable in this city on next Tuesday.

The petitioner attacked the proposed plan of reorganization and says it is designed in the interest of Charles M. Schwab and others who were the promoters of the ship-building syndicate. She charges that a compromise has been effected with Roland R. Conklin, who instituted the original receivership proceedings against the company, and in this compromise, she avers, the interest of herself and other bondholders have not been properly protected. The petitioner goes at length into the transactions of the ship-building company which resulted in the acquiring of the Bethlehem Steel company plant, which was the subject of so much testimony

Working Up Enthusiasm.
Chicago, June 22.—Further to stimulate party enthusiasm a political mass meeting was held in the Auditorium tonight, which was addressed by Senator Dewey and other well known Republican orators, who sounded the keynote of the coming campaign and drove home what they regarded as the strong planks in the platform adopted today.

Long before the meeting began the theater was surrounded by tremendous crowds, waiting for admission, and before the first speech was concluded a number of police surrounded the theater to prevent anyone else forcing an entrance.

Bonic Acid in Foods.
Washington, June 22.—Results obtained from the experiments made by the department of agriculture with a view to ascertaining the effects of bonic acid and bonic acid preservatives in the human system are announced in a report issued by the department.

The general conclusion is reached that it is not advisable to use bonic acid in food articles intended for common and continuous use. At all events, adds the report, the quantity and character of the preservatives used should be plainly marked.

MARQUIS OYAMA.
Appointed to Supreme Command Of Japanese Army.

Tokyo, June 22, 11 a. m.—The Marquis Oyama, formerly marshal and chief of the general staff, has been appointed to the supreme command of the imperial army in the field. His chief of staff will be Lieutenant Kodama, late chief of general staff. Their positions vacated on the general staff in this city will be filled by Field Marshal Yamagata and Maj-Gen. Nagakura.

Teachers Gathering.
St. Louis, June 22.—The teachers have begun to gather for the great convention of the National Educational association. A special train of seven cars, loaded with California teachers, 200 teachers from Iowa and 40 from the state of Washington have arrived.

Logging Camps to Close.
Portland, Ore., June 23.—Owing to over production, it is asserted the logging camps in Oregon will close down during the month of July until some time in August. The exports of lumber has fallen off on the one side by the overproduction and on the other by labor troubles which have paralyzed the market in the eastern states. It is said that logs that were selling for \$8 to \$9 a thousand have dropped to \$5.

Ep. McLaren Ill.
New York, June 23.—Bishop McLaren of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Chicago is critically ill at his summer home in Point Pleasant, N. J., from heart disease. He has suffered one serious attack and the physicians fear a recurrence will prove fatal.

Against Tariff Reduction.
New York, June 23.—The National Industrial association has presented to the chamber of deputies a petition protesting against the tariff reduction accorded to American flour, says a Herald dispatch from Rio Janeiro, Brazil. Deputy Alves has proposed a revision of the tariff law, with the object of adopting a strictly protectionist policy.

Vermont Democratic Ticket.
Burlington, Vt., June 22.—The Democratic state convention today named the following ticket:

Governor—J. H. Porter, Wilmington. Lieutenant-Governor—C. L. McMahon, Stowe.

Treasurer—A. J. Shibley, Montpelier. Secretary of State—C. D. Watson, St. Albans.

Auditor—J. E. Walsh, Pittsford. After these nominations had been made the convention was thrown into an uproar by a motion offered by Mayor J. B. Burke of this city to instruct the delegates to St. Louis for Parker. The mayor was barely able to finish offering the motion on account of his cries of "No, no" and the

general confusion. Later when he tried to withdraw it the chair refused to recognize him. The motion was finally voted down by a large majority.

COMMENT ON PLATFORM.

London Times Says It is Unquestionably Adroit.

London, June 23.—The Times, the only London morning paper which prints an editorial on the platform adopted by the Republican national convention at Chicago, says that the platform bears the stamp of the individuality of President Roosevelt and exerts admiration for its adroitness as well as for its strength.

"Adroit" is unquestionably so," says the Times, "but, save in the few points where the hand of the politician is visibly impressed upon it, it seems to be held and clear and consistent. What the judgment of the people will be it would be neither prudent nor politic to attempt to forecast, but be what it may, it must determine great issues, not for the United States alone, but for civilized mankind."

W. A. CLARK JR.
He is Seriously Ill in Denver, Colo.

Denver, June 22.—William A. Clark, Jr., son of United States Senator W. A. Clark of Montana, is seriously ill at the Stevens and West Colfax apartment in this city. He is suffering from a complete nervous collapse brought on by an attack of heart trouble. The physicians in attendance are hopeful that after a few days' rest their patient will be able to leave his room. Mr. Clark came to Denver 10 days ago to superintend the handling of his horses at Overland park.

LA FOLLETTITES.
They Will Appeal to a Higher Court.

Madison, Wis., June 22.—"We are going before a higher court, and I do not care what the credentials committee reported in Chicago. The situation is not understood there, and the delegates did not want to hurry," said Gov. La Follette today.

"Our campaign is ready to go on and we are ready to meet any move the state committee will make Friday and we will at once proceed to business. Our dependence is on the people."

WON BY THE OREGON

The Trophy for Excellence in Gunnery.

Washington, June 22.—The navy department today awarded to the battleship Oregon the trophy for excellence in gunnery in the last annual target practice for which the ships of the navy had been in competition. For the gunboat class it was determined that the battleship Oregon was the winner, while the trophy for the destroyer class goes to the John Paul Jones of the Pacific squadron.

ANTI-POLYGAMY PLANK.

Urged on Behalf of Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Chicago, June 22.—During the meeting of the committee on resolutions, Senator Gallinger presented and had read a communication from Mrs. Lillian N. Stevens of Evanston, Ill., on behalf of the Women's Christian Temperance union, urging the incorporation of an anti-polygamy plank in the platform, but the subject received no attention beyond a remark or two to the effect that the majority of such proposals would be unwise. No resolution covering the point was presented by any member of the committee, and there was no other mention of the subject.

CAPE TO CAIRO.

First Through Train for Victoria Falls Leaves.

Cape Town, June 22.—The first through train for Victoria Falls left Cape Town today amidst enthusiastic demonstrations.

Hearst Got Minnesota.

Duluth, Minn., June 22.—The Hearst forces captured the temporary organization of the state Democratic convention for the selection of delegates to the national convention today, and it was expected that they would be strong enough to instruct the delegation for their candidate.

For a time it looked as though Hearst sentiment would rule in every thing, and it doubtless would have done so had it not been for a speech of Congressman John Lind, who turned a crowd of excited delegates who clamored for an instructed delegation into one which expressed itself when the vote came as opposed to instructing for Hearst or any other man. The anti-Hearst men secured three of the four delegates-at-large, and will get an even break on the district delegates. The delegates-at-large are John Lind of Minneapolis, L. A. Roseng of Canby Falls, H. L. Buck of Winona and C. D. O'Brien of St. Paul.

The resolutions declare for a reaffirmation of the Kansas City platform, and laud William J. Bryan as the greatest Democratic statesman of the day. Both factions are Bryan supporters.

Ministry Will Resign.

Brisbane, Queensland, June 22.—It is considered certain that the ministry will resign and that parliament will be dissolved in consequence of the vote in the legislative assembly on an amendment to the address in reply to the speech of the governor of Queensland, Maj-Gen. Sir Herbert Charles Chermide, 58 votes being cast for the government as against 55 for the opposition.

From Nome Gold Fields.

Seattle, Wash., June 22.—The steamship Oregon reached port at an early hour this morning from the Nome gold fields. The vessel is the first to complete the round trip this season. The Oregon brought four passengers and more than \$400,000 in bullion consigned to local banks.

The officers of the Oregon report that the treasure on the Oregon represented part of the winter clean-up on a number of claims near Nome. There is a big demand for laborers at the gold fields and wages will probably be \$7.50 a day in the open season.

Kiel Regatta Opens.

Kiel, Prussia, June 22.—The regatta opened today. The weather was cheerless and a steady cold rain fell, but notwithstanding the unfavorable conditions the harbor presented an animated appearance.

FIGHT WITH BANDITS.

Several Wounded and Two Are Captured.

Douglas, Ariz., June 22.—A posse pursuing a band of Mexican bandits accused of having murdered eight American mining men in the Yakul river

valley during the past few weeks came upon them a few miles from the scene of the recent atrocities near Tiers station today. A hot fight ensued, in which several bandits were wounded and two captured. They are now in jail at Pinar de las Rosas. The posse continued in pursuit of the outlaws, and word has arrived that their capture is imminent.

When last heard from the bandits were surrounded south of Oaxaca and had prepared to fight to the death. Intense feeling prevails all along the border and in the mining districts of Sonora, Mexico, because of recent atrocities which are credited to this band.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

Preparations Being Made for One At American Lake, Wash.

Vancouver, B. C., June 22.—Preparations have been completed for the national encampment at American Lake, Wash., which is to extend from July 1 to July 21. The managers will be under the supervision of Maj-Gen. Frederick Funston, U. S. A., and will be performed under the guidance and instruction of a board of eight umpires. Maj. Robert K. Evans, adjutant general, will act as chief umpire, with assistants as follows: Maj. Silas A. Wolf, Nineteenth infantry; Maj-Gen. James B. Ewell, Ninth cavalry; Capt. Andrew S. Rowan, Nineteenth infantry; Capt. Daniel L. Tate, Third cavalry, and Capt. Manus McCleskey, artillery corps. The divisions will be separated into two brigades. The first brigade will be stationed at Camp Stehacom under command of Col. Edward S. Godfrey, Ninth cavalry.

The second brigade, which will be commanded by Col. Joseph H. Huston, Nineteenth infantry, will be stationed at a point called "Hugueness Place," while his on the opposite side of the headquarters camp from the location of the first brigade.

Anglesey Castle.

New York, June 22.—Anglesey Castle, which was recently taken possession of by the British, is a fine specimen of a castle taken by the creditors of the Marquis of Anglesey, is declared to be a veritable treasure house, says a Herald dispatch from London. One report is current to the effect that the value of \$125,000 were found lying in a drawer, and it is now stated that the castle contains property affirmed to be in the aggregate worth more than \$5,000,000. Scores of objects of the highest art are said to have been found just as they arrived from Paris, simply opened and put aside unpacked.

King Receives Gen. Booth.

London, June 22.—King Edward received Gen. Booth of the Salvation Army at Buckingham palace today and discussed the forthcoming international convention of Salvatorians. Staff Commissioner Pollard submitted to his majesty information regarding the work of the Salvation Army. King Edward displayed special interest in writings in relation to the work of the army in behalf of the poor, and on parting with Gen. Booth expressed his sympathy with his work and most cordial good wishes for his prosperity and success.
