In an opinion handed hown by the supreme court today, the court re-verses the decision of the Third dis-trict court in the case of Christina Pugmire against the Oregon Short Line railroad, appellants. The case was brought by Mrs. Pugmire to recover \$10,000 damages for injuries sustained at Williams, Mont., July 22, 1995, while on a construction train. This is the second time the supreme court has sat on this matter, a re-bearing having been granted upon application. Mrs. Pugmire set out that while she was on a construction car at the time and place mentioned an engine belong-ing to the defendant company ran into

was on a construction car at the time and place mentioned an engine belong-ing to the defendant company ran into the string of cars and as a result of the impact she was severely injured. The company set out in its defense that an agreement had been entered into before Mrs. Pugmire went aboard the train releasing the company from all claims for injuries. The supreme court holds this to be void. The cita-tion of errors contained one in which it was stated that the court of train allowed the plaintiff to introduce evi-dence regarding injuries to her cyes, which were not specified in the court erred in so doing and on this ground re-verses the case. Judgment was award-ed in the trial court in favor of the plaintiff amounting to \$2,500.
