FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Abandoned—Passed its Second Reading.

LONDON, 25.—The home rule members of Parliament have abandoned their intention of attending the home rule banquet in Dublin on the 4th of August, because Mr. Newdegate's conversion to the cause of the cause, is expected to come up in the House of Commons at that time.

Extraordinary Bill of Waters—The Presbyterian Constitution.

The House of Commons has passed the Canada copyright bill.

The Central Press report of the scenes in the House over the ship-ping bill, says it was remarked in the lobbies that there was much method in Pimms's madness. His outburst was apparently prearranged. Pimms came to the House with his valise, and was prepared to go to prison; he has been in the library of the Commons to-day, searching for precedents. He persists in his refusal to withdraw his remarks. A tremendous scene is expected when the subject comes up again on the ship-ping bill.

The waters of the river Nile, at Peterborough, are from fifteen to twenty feet above the ordinary level; the rise was so sudden that the bedrooms in the buildings along the river were flooded between Earth and Denmark, and 3,000 tenants to be deprived of pasturage, the water being three and four feet deep on 4,000 acres of land near Whitby.

The constitution adopted by the Presbyterian council has been made public. The name given to the new union is "Alliance of the Reformed Presbyterian Church throughout the world." All the churches are included which hold to the Presbyterian system and level. The committee on the constitution recites the object of the alliance, which aims to demonstrate the unity of belief among Protestants to organize mission work, promote education and social reform, and to oppose infidelity and religious intolerance.

PRUSSIA.

German Exhibitors at the Centennial.

BERLIN, 25.—The list of German exhibitors at the Philadelphia Centennial exhibition has been officially closed. The number of those who intend to exhibit in the art department is 800. The large manufacturers of the Rhine and Westphalia and Saxony will be specially represented. An imperial commissioner has been appointed to obtain money for the German department in the exhibition building.

Submitting to the Law.

The government continues to receive, from important members of the Catholic clergy, their submission to the law relative to the administration of church property.

SPAIN.

Religious Tolerance Clause Adopted.

MADRID, 25.—The constitutional committee yesterday adopted the article of the proposed constitution establishing religious toleration.

Released.

SANTANDER, 25.—The Carlists have released the crew of the Spanish steamer *Bayona*, which was wrecked near Matia.

MEXICO.

Deaths from Cholera.

CITY OF MEXICO, 16.—There were 198 deaths in Vera Cruz during the month of June, of which 125 were from cholera.

Failed.

Schultz & Mohr, general merchants, have failed for \$1,500,000.

Warning from Don Carlos.

Don Carlos has written a letter to Alfonso, reproaching him for allowing the civil war to be conducted with such severe rigor, and counseling moderation on the side of the Alfonsists, on pain of reprisals by the Carlists.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Lockout in the Cotton Trade.

LONDON, 25.—In accordance with the notices given by the cotton masters of Ashton, Staleybridge, Dukinfield and Macclesfield, a lock-out commenced in several of the mills on Saturday, and unless the operatives yield by the end of a month the mills still open will be closed as this notice of the notice expires, in which case several thousand people will be thrown out of employment. In the meantime the strike on foot by the operatives in Oldham goes into effect to-morrow, and will involve 100 mills and 18,000 hands.

Will Support the Strikers—Going to Turkey—Arrested.

The working men's associations of Yorkshire, Lancashire and Cheshire have resolved to support the locked-out and striking mill operatives.

The Standard reports that Mr. Neudomere will retire from the British Post Office, and go to Turkey to organize a postal service there, in accordance with the Berne convention.

A dispatch from Berlin says that Count Ozenbeck, his mother and her chambermaid, have been arrested at Landeck, in the district of Breslau, charged with being concerned in a conspiracy to assassinate Prince Frederick William.

LIVERPOOL, 25.—A meeting was held at Bickley, to endorse Pimms's course in Parliament; several thousand sailors and working men were present. Resolutions expressing sympathy with and pledging support to Pimms were adopted.

PRUSSIA.

Submitting to the Law.

BERLIN, 25.—The North German Gazette, commenting on the recent submission of Catholic clergy-men to the law for the administration of church property, says, "The episcopate has thereby abandoned the principle hitherto maintained, that politics in ecclesiastical matters are excluded, regulated by means of independent arrangements between the state and church." The Gazette infers that the Roman curia has given permission to the clergy to decide for themselves, at the same time assuring them that a decision in favor of submission will not be regarded as an endorsement of papal authority. "This," continues the Gazette, "may be considered as changing the struggle between the political and ecclesiastical powers, and the Catholic episcopate will probably urge upon Rome the necessity of extending further freedom of action in these matters."
