Third South and Main. The case will be 16 feet long, five feet high, four feet deep, and will contain five sections. The outer seccontain five sections. The length of the drawers is 40 inches, permitting the placing of two forms of ticket in each compariment, making the full capacity 1,280 forms in the entire case. MOFFATT ROAD FINANCED. A Denver dispatch states that David H. Moffatt, president of the Moffatt road, has completed arrangements for financing the building of the remaining distance of his road between Steamboat Springs and Salt Lake City. The de-tails of the deal, it is stated, were completed in New York Saturday, and Mr. Moffatt will receive \$4,000,000 with which to complete the road. The financ-ing was done by Haligarten & Co., rep. resentatives of Dutch capitalists. One million dolars of the amount received was used to retire notes for that amount executed in February, and the deal leaves the Moffat road free of any cur-rent liabilities and with \$3,000,000 in the rent liabilities and with \$3,000,000 in the treasury with which to rush construc-tion. The money comes from men who recently sold their holdings in the Colo-rado & Southern road.

HEAR GOVERNMENT DEMURRER

Testimony was taken this morning in the Federal court room before special examiner George N. Brown of the interstate commerce commission. In the objection of the United States

In the objection of the United States government to a charge by the D. & R. G. Rallroad company of \$440 for demurrage. The case arose in July 1907, when several cars of cement were shipped to Thistle for use in the Strawberry project of the recla-mation service. The government was slow in emptying the cars, hence the demurrage suit. The objection of the government is based on the fact that it helped to build the Diamond switch, located about two and one half miles from Thistle, by doing the grading, and that it had ample room there for tracking the cars of cement, and de-murrage should not therefore be charged.
