MARROQUIN AND CANAL. In a Message to the Colombian Congress He Points Out Alternatives to be Considered. Tenor of Document is Rather in

Favor of the Trenty With the United States.

Colon, Colombia, July 17,-The text of President Marroquin's message submitted to the Colombian congress has eached here. The part referring to the

Panama canal says: Panama canal says: "There are two alternatives before the government. Firstly, the curtail-ment of Colombian sovereignty in con-sideration of certain pecuniary advanages; and, secondly, to rigorously maintain sovereignty and demand per emptorily the money indemnity to which we consider ourselves entitled In the first case the wishes of the in hanitants of the department of Panam will be satisfied, but the governmen runy be afterwards accused of failing to defend the sovereignty of the country and the interests of the nation, In th second place if the canal is not built via the Panama route the government will be accused of failing to obtain the alth of which the canal may be regarded as the beginning and which may be the sole condition of our fu-ture aggrandisement. I have already made known my wish that an inter-oceanic canal should be opened through our territory. I think our territory. I think even at courd sacrifice we should not place obsta cles in the way of such a grand enter prise because it would surely result i a gigantic material improvement of o ountry; also, because once the canal is pened we will expand and draw closer in our relations to North America, whereby our industries, commerce and wealth would be greatly benefitted.
