MARIA LEVEDAHL.

OGDEN, Utah, February 17, 1896.—Sister Maria W. Levedahl was the daughter of Jacob and Christina Wahlquist, and was born June 27, 1834, at Wisby, on the island of Gotland. On June 17, 1859, she was married to Lars Gustaf Levedahl. She was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints June 14, 1862, and came to Utah July 24, 1873, and settled at Mound Fort, in Weber county. For several years she has been severely afflicted with paralysis, and for eighteen years she has been deprived of her eyesight. During her painful sufferings she was patient and uncomplaining. On February 7, 1896, death relieved her from further physical anguish.

The funeral services, which were largely attended, were held in the Mound Fort meeting house, February 9th. At the obsequies Elders T. A. Halgren and N. C. Flygare paid high tributes to the worth, integrity and hospitality of the deceased. Elder John W. Hess, of Davis

Stake, and Elder Gilbert Torgerson also made consoling remarks and bore testimony to the faithful life of Sister Levedahl; and concluding remarks were made by Bishop James Taylor.

ARCHIBALD MILLER YOUNG.

Archibald Miller Young, familiarly known as "Father Young," died at Richfield, Sevier county, Utah, February 5, 1896, of old age. The funeral services were largely attended, the deceased being held in much esteem in the community. Consoling and hope inspiring remarks were made by Elders William H. Seegmiller, of the Stake presidency; Theodore Brandley, Bishop of the ward; Simon Christensen, Stake clerk, and one or two other Elders.

The noble qualities of the departed were alluded to in fitting terms by the several speakers, and the bereaved family and friends feelingly admonished to emulate the good example shown by him while in life. The departed was born August 10, 1822, at Kirkmulloch, Scotland, and baptized in the early 50's. He was ordained an Elder in 1846 by Elder Robert Sands, and immigrated to Utah in 1873, landing in Salt Lake City, Nov. 14 of that year. Moved to Richfield in 1874, and labored faithfully always for the cause of truth.

He was a kind and loving father and friend, and a veritable peacemaker. Father Young was a High Priest, he having been ordained to this high calling in the Church a number of years ago. He leaves a wife, and a numerous family of children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren to mourn his loss. Peace to his ashes.

AGNES STEELE PARK.

Agnes Steele Park departed this life at her residence, No. 114 Third street, Salt Lake City, on Friday morning at 6 o'clock. She had been ailing more or less for some time, but death was not expected so soon or so suddenly. She had taken a newspaper and gone into an adjoining room to read; her granddaughter, Aggie Kenner, who was with her at the time, followed her and found her lying on the floor; making some remark about that being a peculiar position to read in and receiving no reply, she went to her grandmother and spoke to her, but receiving no reply for a moment, took her in her arms. After a faint smile and the words "Oh, Aggie!" the vital spark departed. The information was at once communicated to the neighbors and the husband; he was immediately and has since remained well nigh prostrated with grief, a happy married life of more than half a century having caused their lives to grow in each other and become so firmly united that the separation was almost beyond endurance. All the sustaining influence that the unaffected sympathy of a host of friends, their kind ministrations and their earnest prayers can produce has been with the afflicted husband throughout.

Sister Park was born at Kilbourne, Scotland, on April 3, 1827. In her early girlhood she first heard the Gospel, and at the expense of many friendships and general ostracism she accepted it and was baptized into the Church. In her sixteenth year she was married to Brother Hamilton G. Park, and in a few years she emigrated to Zion, the vicissitudes of travel in those days and the necessity of foraging as they progressed causing them to occupy two years in the trip. They arrived here in 1852 and have lived here ever since. Ten children have been born to them, of whom four only are living—Isabel G., wife of S. A. Kenner; Annie A., wife of J. H. Midgley; Arthur H., and Mabel G., wife of Joseph Thomas. Besides these they have had

24 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Funeral services took place at the residence today, commencing at 2 p.m., being conducted by Bishop Empey, of the Thirteenth ward, whose first counselor Brother Park is. They were of the most impressive and consolatory character, after which the interment took place in the family grounds in the city cemetery, a large concourse of sorrowing friends being in the funeral train.

Sister Park was widely known and universally respected wherever known. As a wife and mother she was most exemplary, as a neighbor and friend none was more highly esteemed, and she died as she had ever lived—firm in the faith of the Gospel and assured of a resurrection with the just and eternal salvation.
