### Rapid Transit Will Put in 60-Minute Service Nov. 1.

Service Nov. 1. The Orden Rapid Transit company will operate the line running from the city limits on the north to the Utah Hot Springs after Nov. 1. A service of one car every hour will be put into effect for the winter months, the cars leaving the corner of Washington avenue and Twenty-fifth street 25 min-utes after the hour. The fare to be charged is as follows: From any part of Ogden City to the city limits, 5 cents; from the city limits to the store at North Ogden, 5 cents; from there to Pleasant View, 5 cents, and from Pleas-ant View to the Hot Springs 5 cents. Round trip tickets will be 30 cents. A coupon ticket rate of 24 rights for \$1 will be given. will be given.
