

MONETARY MATTERS ARE WELL IN HAND

Local Banks Adopt Rules and Regulations to Head Off Trouble.

HOURLY CARS TO HOT SPRINGS

Rapid Transit Will Operate Electrical Service After Nov. 1—Continued City News Notes.

Ogden, Oct. 31.—The new rules and regulations adopted by the Ogden banks yesterday morning have not worked any hardship on the business men and it is not expected they will. The rule adopted that no depositor shall be privileged to draw out more than \$50 at one time and that not more than twice a week, was at first looked upon as a hardship, but on receiving the cashier's check for all desired over the \$50 the customers have been satisfied. The savings departments of the various banks will require from all the full time of notice before they can draw out their money. The banks will, as usual, receive checks for any sum.

The clearance house rules as adopted recently by most of the banks of the country, are practically the same as those passed upon by the local banks for their regulation. All of the banks of the city have joined the association and assert that the present regulations must govern all their business so long as they consider the financial conditions are such that their deposits must be protected.

CARS TO HOT SPRINGS.

Rapid Transit Will Put in 60-Minute Service Nov. 1.

The Ogden Rapid Transit company will operate the line running from the city limits on the north to the Utah Hot Springs after Nov. 1. A service of one car every hour will be put into effect for the winter months, the cars leaving the corner of Washington avenue and Twenty-fifth street 25 minutes after the hour. The fare to be charged is as follows: From any part of Ogden City to the city limits, 3 cents; from the city limits to the store at North Ogden, 5 cents; from there to Pleasant View, 5 cents; and from Pleasant View to the Hot Springs 5 cents. Round trip tickets will be 30 cents. A coupon ticket rate of 24 cents for \$1 will be given.

MEETING OF BUSINESS MEN.

To Confer With Harriman Engineer on Viaduct Question.

Ogden, Oct. 31.—An important meeting of the business men of Ogden, convened this afternoon at the Weber club, to confer with George McConnel of the engineering department of the Harriman roads, concerning the construction of the viaduct over Twenty-fourth street. Mr. McConnel says it is the desire of the company to begin work at once on the viaduct, which is to extend from the east side of Wall avenue west 2,271 feet, and that it is necessary for the business men to decide just what they want done as to the Wall avenue approaches, a matter which must be settled at once. The railroad company will today file with the city recorder an application for a franchise to construct the viaduct, and it is expected that definite action will be taken next Monday evening. The approaches on Twenty-fourth street will be 235 feet long and the structure is to be a practical duplicate of the Salt Lake viaduct, except that it will be longer. It will be built of concrete and steel.
