

REPORTS ON INDIANS

Major's Governor Says Ranch-ers Being Harassed and Cattle Killed. UNCOMPAHNS DISAPPOINTED.

Utah Ute Gather in the Mountains to Hold a Good-Will Indian Dance.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Senator Blaine of Idaho received another dispatch today from Governor Hiram Wood, dated at Boise, last night, as follows:

"Complaints continue today. Fences are being burned and cattle killed. Indians come from Lemhi, Camille, Fort Hall and Snake Valley, and are killing and robbing and are trouble making. They now display or trouble making."

This was once communicated to the Interior department, and the Secretary immediately wired Agent in Charge at Fort Hall to expedite his investigation of the situation, and to report on the progress of the investigation to the Interior department.

The Indians are taking a decided stand against it, and in a report to the Washington department dated June 29, the present trouble, says: "The proposition to disarm the Indians of their rifles is not practical, and it is not possible to disarm them. The only way to collect every gun on the reservation, the supply could be renewed by a few more from the various towns adjoining the reservation. These Indians are not armed in the ordinary sense of the term, but like all hunting people, some of them possess shotguns and rifles for hunting purposes only. As such arms are few, and are not used for anything but hunting, it would be wise to disarm them."

The agent adds that he does not believe many of them will venture into the country to hunt, but he can hardly be expected that a control of the reservation which they believe has been unjustly taken away, and which is now being used by the Indians as a hunting ground, and in which the hunting rights of the Indians were negatively decided.

In another letter the game warden was advised by the agent, as the most effective way of preventing their depredations was to keep them out of the country, and to keep the Indians in the vicinity of the reservation.

Four Indians, Men, June 30.—Four Indians of the reservation here are under orders to be in readiness to move to the Fort Hall Indian reservation in case of trouble with the Indians of that vicinity. The troops designated are under command of Lieutenant Colonel Hamilton and number 24 men.

Transportation will be furnished from Fort D. A. Russell, Wy. Washington, D. C. June 30.—The department has received a telegram from Brigadier General Coppinger, commanding the department of the Pacific at Omaha, stating that in accordance with the instructions sent to him yesterday, he had sent a detachment of experienced men in dealing with the Indians in the vicinity of Hall, Idaho, to assist the troops.
