HOME AGAIN.—Elder R. V. Morris, who left this city for the East, on the 17th of March, arrived home last night, in good health. He had a good time during his absence, but is very glad to get home again. He gave us the details of a serious accident which occurred on the U. P. R. R. last Wednesday morning about quarter past one o'clock, about an hour before the arrival of the train on which he was a passenger. At that time a band of about three hundred Indians mounted on ponies were fording the Platte river, crossing to the side on which the rails are laid. Quite a number had crossed, some of whom were standing on the track; others were crossing or ascending the bank of the river. While thus congregated the eastern bound train hove in sight, and on seeing it the Indians began to yell. The engineer, not knowing what they meant, and fearing mischief was intended, put on steam and dashed through the crowd, killing, as Bro. Morris was informed by some of the railway hands, thirteen Indians and as many ponies. How near this statement was to the truth Bro. Morris could not say, but he knows that some lives must have been lost, for while the train he was in passed over the spot, the wheels of the engine and carriages were smeared with blood and hair.

Died:

In Springfield, May 23, 1870, of bilious fever and disease of the lungs, Charlotte, wife of Elias Harmer, aged 31 years, 7 months and 15 days. She joined the Church in 1848, emigrated to Nauvoo in 1841, crossed the plains to these valleys in 1851. She died as she lived—a Saint.

PROCLAMATION.

To whom it may concern:—Whereas, one Thomas Knapp was convicted of the crime of murder in the Third Judicial District Court of this Territory, and was sentenced by said Court to be shot to death, on the 17th day of June, A. D. 1870, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4 p. m. of that day; and, whereas, it has been represented to me that if the said Thomas Knapp is reprieved for the period of thirty days, that such representations can be made to His Excellency Governor Shaffer as will induce him to commute the sentence of death.

Now, therefore, I, S. A. Mann, Acting-Governor of Utah Territory, by virtue of authority in me vested, do hereby reprieve the said Thomas Knapp, and direct that said execution be delayed for the period of thirty days, and that the sentence of the Court aforesaid be carried out on Saturday, the 16th day of July, A. D. 1870, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4 p. m., as in said sentence ordered.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of this Territory to be affixed, this 16th day of June, A. D. 1870.
