THREW SCISSORS AT HIS SISTER AND BLINDED HER.

BURNED TO DEATH ON CHRISTMAS.

Shot a Horse to Prevent Being Dragged to Death—By Hunter Accidentally Killed—Chris was Killed.

Henry Holroyd, 55 years of age, was burned to death in a fire at the Christiana place on Saturday. He was asleep in an upper story of the building when the fire started.

A peculiar accident happened in the vicinity of Provo, Utah, Christmas eve. While walking in the neighborhood of the town, a man named Chris, who was a member of the local fire department, was shot in the back by a bullet fired from a gun which he was carrying.

While driving over the San Juan road leading to the Warren & Malley quarry, in San Mateo county, Cal., Friday evening, Frank Scott and John Miron drove over a ten-foot bank and into a ravine. The buggy was overturned and Scott, who was on the outside, escaped with a few bruises, but Scott fell striking his head upon a rock and was instantly killed.

A badly decomposed body was found floating in the bay near Port Costa, Cal., on Saturday morning. It has been identified as that of Gus Anderson, who for some years was a well known character along the waterfront.

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Carl Hartow, the only one of the P. Hartow, of the Merle Hartow, who was shot by the accidental discharge of his gun as he was holding a gun in his hand, at San Jose, Cal., on Saturday. Last Thursday an operation was performed, and pieces of clothing and a number of bones were removed from the wound. Blood poisoning set in, Hartow improved in a semi-conscious condition until death. He was 17 years of age.

A sailor named William Brown, from the ship Queen of England, was run over and instantly killed near Port Costa, Cal., on Saturday night. Brown was seen shortly before midnight walking alone on the beach. He was carrying a gun and was shot in the back by a bullet fired from a gun which he was carrying.

A little girl 4 years old, daughter of a poor woodchopper, was burned to death Christmas day at the family's house near Lake Washington, state of Washington. The father was at work during the day, and the mother had come to town to see a friend, leaving the five children, the oldest a girl of 12 years at home. While playing about the house the youngest approached the stove and in some way her clothing caught fire. The other children rushed from the house, calling for their father. By the time he reached home and succeeded in putting out the flames the child was so badly injured that she died in a short time. The flames had been kindled into the range.

Carbon County, Wyo. Journal: Henry Foster of Olin, Wyo., employed on the Big Horn branch of the Rock Island road, was killed by a freight train Tuesday and had it not been for his nerve and presence of mind he would have met an awful death. Foster left the ranch on horseback, leading three other horses attached to the point of his saddle. The horse he was riding slipped and fell, throwing Foster to the ground. He was not hurt, but the horse was killed. Foster escaped with some bruises and scratches and with one of the small horses of the lot broken, but otherwise he had a lucky escape.

A distressing and probably fatal accident happened at the Mountain school house, twenty-three miles northwest of Provo, Cal., on Friday night. "Mama Claus" was usually taken to death. The school house, made in a specially suited district of the line of the road and with little facilities for communication with the world. Control is in the hands of a woman who was known as Mrs. Clark. She was going to visit the Mount Mountain school house, and that a Christian was among the attendees. The children looked at the place with interest and awe. The mother and grown sisters of the little ones were there, too, and a crowd of men went to see the show. There were over 200 people in the school building when the accident happened. The Christmas tree with 100 colored lights, decorated with evergreen branches and their gifts, was immediately in front of the entrance. At the appointed hour Mrs. Clark, dressed in a blue dress, was represented by George Brown, who lived at Mount Mountain, made a speech. In making his way past the tree Santa Claus was wearing a little crown, for he got too near the tree and one of the candles set fire to the inflammable mass of cotton. Within half a minute Santa Claus was wrapped in flames. Two or three men in the audience and the presence of mind to prevent the catastrophe, much from his purpose of taking down the tree and cut into the open air.
