Telegrams were sent by the chairman to the presidents of six of the great western and northwestern roads, and replies have now been received from all of them. From the information conveyed by the railroad companies today, the by the railroad companies today the commissioners express the opinion that one cause for the shortage in fuel is that the dealers have not stored up in advance sufficient quantities for the winter's supply, but have, as stat. ed in the reply by President James J. Hill of the Great Northern, ordered unly sufficient supplies to last from day today. Whatever shortage may exist in car equipment, they say, is aggravated by lack of motive power, inadequate terminal facilities and in-sufficient trackage properly to move sufficient trackage properly to move the great valume of business pouring in on the railroads, suppremented by the delays on the part of the ship-pers in loading and unloading their

"Replying to your message repeated from St. Faul to New York, am on my way to St. Faul to meet commissionway to St. Paul to meet commission-ers tomorrow. The coal scarcity in North Dakota is not due to want of cars. Thousands of empty cars have been moving from the head of Lake Superior to the grain fields during the fall, and coal ordered by local dealers has been only sufficient to supply from day to day. During the last two weeks there have been very heavy snow-storms, with the thermometer below vere. Snowdrifts around stations from torms, with the thermometer below sero. Snowdrifts around stations from six to 15 feet deep have temporarily blocked railroads. Special trains of coal, having right of way over all other traffic, are being sent and road is being opened as fast as conditions will allow. The fuel difficulty is tem-porary and is being rapidly remedied. The general condition applying to all traffic is due to the rapid increase in tonnage to be moved. "Permanent relief can only come through increase of double track and training for \$60,000,000 covering the next two years, to provide additional tracks, terminals, equipment and new lines where traffic is heaviest. Paul as follows: "There is a scarcity of fuel in some parts of the country served by our line, but we do not know of any shortage of other necessaries of life. Our company has done and will continue to do all that it can to prevent suffering. I think the reason given in your message, namely, extraordinary delays in mov-ing, is incorrect, so far as this com-pany is concerned. The difficulty in Montana, idaho and Washington is that not enough coal is being produced to supply promptly the increased domestic trade and at the same time furnish the railroad with fuel for the operation of railroad with fuel for the operation of its trains.

"In North Dakota and Minnesota the "In North Dakota and Minnesota the difficulty in part is due to trying to move too much fuel in a very short time, and in part to an increase in the consumption of fuel that is greater than the increase in the facilities for handling, moving and storing. Also a general increase in the movement of rniscellaneous commodities which can-not be ignored without subjecting our-selves to charges of discrimination. For a month particular attention has been a month particular attention has been a month particular attention has been given to the movement of coal and that commodity is now being given prefer-ence both as to cars and service. We know of only one case on our line in North Dakota where there has been serious difficulty, and believe that has been relieved."

Maryland Senators Introduce Resolutions on Japanese Question.

Washington, Dec. 17.-Senators Whyte and Rayner of Maryland cach presented resolutions in the sen-ate today touching the state's rights question involved in the Japanese controversy. The resolution of Mr. Whyte resolves that there shall be no increase in federal power by a strain-cd construction of the Constitution at the expense of the rights of the states. The Rayner resolution provides that the functions of the executive shall be limited to the performance of the duties assigned to him by the of the duties assigned to him by the Constitution and the legislation enact-ed thereunder, and that the result be no interference by the executive in the legislative or judicial branches of the government or with the rights of the states. It is also resolved that the states have no authority to sur-render any of their reserved rights under the Constitution. Both resolutions were laid on the Both resolutions were laid on the table for future action.

It is the belief of the police that the woman was mur-dered and then placed in the barrei and burned. This theory is strength-ened by the odor of kerosene near the place. The identity of the woman has not been established. County Detective Jones said to-night that it was his opinion that the body found is not that of a Hazelton woman, but that the girl was murder.
