The Japanese fire ceased at 2:20 m, and the enemy retired in the di-rection of Askold Island. Simultane-ously two torpedo boat destroyers appeared near Askold island and two nore near Cape Maidel. The Japanese ships were covered with ice. The attack resulted in no loss to the
