Correspondence.

COPENHAGEN, Dec. 23, 1871.

Pres. A. Carrington:

Dear Brother—It affords me much pleasure to be able to inform you that during the past year the Lord has prospered the labors of his servants so much that 1021 souls have been baptized; and that in spite of the opposition the good cause still continues its onward course.

During the year a few more have been baptized in Sweden than in Denmark, though in proportion to the inhabitants the latter country still yields the largest per cent. Denmark has been missionaried so thoroughly that there is hardly a house which has not been visited by a servant of God; in Sweden the people are scattered over a many times larger territory and it takes much longer time to make them as well acquainted with our principles as here.

In Norway the progress of the work has also been gratifying. There is the only place where our brethren suffer any persecution—lately, some more of them have been imprisoned for administering the ordinances of the gospel.

The trial of President Young has created quite a stir among the people, and the press is busy on the "Mormon Question." It had considerable to say during the time it was rumored that President Young had fled, but the last news was about in this strain—"Alas! the rumor is not confirmed, etc." It treats the question in a very unfair manner and copies the lowest and most filthy lies from the English papers, lies exposed long ago, but they go down very well a second time.

The last dodge our enemies have resorted to is to hint that we can not claim protection under the Danish "Grundlov" (constitution). The other day one of the leading papers had an article in which it had copied some of the editorial remarks from the *Stjerne*, in defense of polygamy. On these it reasons in this wise—Polygamy is punishable under the law with imprisonment from two to six years. The Mormons defend it and teach polygamy as a correct principle; consequently they teach something that is contrary to law, which is the basis of public order; hence they can not claim protection under the "Grundlov," as that grants freedom to the citizens to unite in congregations to worship according to their own desire, with the express provision that nothing be taught that is contrary to morality and good order." I think this has only been thrown out as a feeler; but still it shows the way the current flows.

I had a very nice visit to Aarhus, Aalborg, Skane and Odense to attend Conference meetings. We appointed a good many young elders to work as missionaries during the winter. We are determined that the people shall not have the excuse of not having heard the gospel. In Aarhus Bro. C. Madson has brought several of the better classes into the Church, and is doing finely. In Aalborg, notwithstanding the rich harvest of former years, the work is still progressing. Little Jensen is a zealous young man. In Skane, Bro. Dehlin has quite an effective force of nearly a score young elders in the field. He has himself been quite low with the small-pox, but is now, thanks to kind providence, considerably better and we hope he will stand it. Bro. N. P. Petersen, an intelligent young native elder, has been appointed as president there. Stockholm is in a fine condition under the able administration of E. Petersen. Bro. Grue is performing a good work in Jonkoping. Bro. Weiby at Christiana is a man in the right place. In Copenhagen Conference, Bro. P. Madson and a good number of elders are trying to wake the people out of their lethargy, which is indeed a Herculean task, the people seem so drowsy and indifferent on religious matters. Our meetings here in the city are being advertised extensively in the papers, which they are kind enough to do for nothing.

Bro. Soderborg arrived here on the 4th inst., feeling well and hearty. He has gone to Gotaborg, where I have appointed him a mission at present.
