BOND RESOLUTION.

Adopted by the House Committee of
Ways and Means.

IN FAVOR OF THE ISSUE OF BONDS.

A Minority Report is to be Written by
Rep.-The Vote Is
Detail.

Washington, Feb. 13.—The House committee on Ways and Means voted today, 8 to 6, to report to the House the funding resolution, agreed upon by the subcommittee.

Both by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States in Congress assembled, that the secretary of the treasury be and is hereby authorized to have and dispose of as we see fit, per annum, gold coins, bullion or United States with qualities, privilege and exemptions of bonds issued under the act approved July 14, 1875, which "An act authorizing the funding of the national debt held in an amount not exceeding \$100,000,000, and having interest at a rate not exceeding a percent per annum, principal and interest payable in gold coin of the present standard of weight and fineness, will bonds to be payable not more than thirty years after date provided, however, that as part of the proceeds of the sale of said bonds as were referred with the proceeds to available for the payment of the current expenses of the government."

The vote was as follows: For the bill—Wilson, Tammey, Turner, Montague, Stevens, Cutts, Overton, and Moore, 8; against—McMichael, Whiting, Bryant, and Stebbins, 6.

Against—Steebins, Whiting, Bryant, and Stebbins.

Wilson did not vote. Davis and Gandy were absent.

A minority report will be written by Bryant. The resolution against the reorganization of national bank notes by the treasury, which however, Gandy requested yesterday and which the subcommittee recommended, was not voted on. The vote was as follows: For the bill—Wilson, Tammey, Cutts, Overton, and Moore, 8; against—Whiting, Bryant, and Stebbins.

A resolution prepared by Wheeler, declaring the enacting of the President's recommendations would be an amendment to the bill, was voted down by the committee, but it was voted for by the House.

The resolution will be voted on in the House tomorrow. The House will then have a question of adjournment from the ways and means committee having the right of way.

It is learned that new legislation in the form of a bill is to be introduced in the Senate and House before Friday, the Michigan-Hamilton amendment will have the preference of right of purchase.
