People of Weber County Are Asking Help to Eradicate It.

John H. Taylor and O. C. Raymond of Plain Clty, Weber county, are in town to look after the interests of citizens of Weber county who were damaged by the State order to destroy their orchards in order to exterminate the San Jose Scale. This is a disease which infected the orchards in a wholesale way in Weber county and is said to have been imported in nursery stock. It is estimated that \$15,000 It worth of trees have been de-stroyed and probably a thousand more will have to be killed in order to s of eradicate the pest. Plain City has been the greatest sufferer in the county from this scourge, its loss alone reaching to the vicinity of \$12,000, or about two-thirds of the total loss. There are many widows and other poor people who are absolutely too poor to apply the exter-minating process to their trees and un-less the action against the pests is gen-eral it will be futile. These widows have destroyed most of their trees, and now they have no source of income. Last year the revenue to the State from fruit was over \$1,000,000, but that resource will be cut down very materially unless stringent remedies are applied at once, and by all. The governor in
