1904, and the overtures for harmony were declined. Mr. Lippman asserted that "church influence" dominated the convention that nominated the Republican state ticket. On being requested to state a case of such influence, the instances cited were promptly and effectually proved to be unwarranted. The committee offered to make any honorable and reasonable concession possible, and labored long and earnestly to induce the Tribune to support the Republican ticket, but without avail. The committee in substance stated that it had not the desire, nor would it at all, aid or discourage the cause of anyone who aspired to the office of United States senator, or to any office, and that it had but one purpose and duty, and that was to elect the whole Republican ticket, both national and state. . That this committee had no favorites to reward and no enemies to punish; that party success and an impartial discharge of the trust committed to the committee by the Republicans of the state as their representatives in conducting the campaign, were the exclusive objects of the committee. Complaint was also made that the

senior senator was not consulted in the appointment and organization of this committee. Thereupon members of the committee at once offered to resign, that others to be selected by the senior senator might take their places. Sufficient members were willing to do this,

to give the senior senator an equal voice in the committee, but even this was declined. Offers were also made that the senior senator and his friends were. privileged to select speakers for the campaign, and especially if it was desired, to select speakers who should accompany the nominee for governor on the Republican ticket on his tour of campaign. Every offer and inducement was made to them whereby they would have full voice in framing conducting and controlling the policy of the campaig A. All these offers were rejected.

The motive of the committee in thus attempting by concessions to secure the support of the senior senator, and that of the Tribune, for the ticket, was not because we admit that the proferred concessions of right belonged to them, but because we felt that it was our duty as Republicans to leave no stone unturned to secure that entire harmony in the party in this state which would insure not only party success (for we desire to say we do not entertain any fear that any disappointed or rejected candidate is able to defeat the party of progress in this state) but to be certain of a greater and enlarged Republican majority.

We deny his right to impugn the motive or good faith of any candidate before that convention, and finally we resent on behalf of the good people of Utah, the unwarrantable charges of "church influence" made by him, his newspaper and his followers. We denounce his action as not only hostile to the Republican party, but also as an attack upon the people of Utah, and the progress which marks the civil and political institutions of the state. We deny the right, as we question the ability, of any person to revive the bitterness of the past. Every college and institution of learning, every schoolhouse in Utah, the good feeling and friendly relations between all classes of cltizens of this peaceful and prosperous state, contradict the charges of the Tribune, and the malicious and untruthful utterances of the platform of the new party attempted to be

organized by the senior senator. The majority of the Constitutional convention which framed our state Constitution, was composed of Republicans, and likewise of members of the dominant Church in Utah. That Constitution provided:

"The rights of conscience shall never be infringed. The state shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; no religious dest shall be required as a qualification for any office of public trust or for any vote at any election; nor shall any person be incompetent as a witness or juror on account of religious belief or the absence thereof. There shall be no union of church and state, nor shall any church dominate the state or interfere with its functions." Upon the provision of our Constitu-

tion the Republican party stands.

browing open on the 5th day of March, 1505. This date has been selected by Congress for the opening, and the local land office has been crowding the work for many months in order to get its records completed within the required time.

Surveyor General E. H. Anderson stated this morning when asked as to the status of the reservation surveys, that he believed the work was so far long that it could be finished wel within the required time. "However," he added, "we have been doing a remarkably large amount of work in a short time to prepare for this opening. The reservation contains a total of 125 townships. Of these we have complet-ed our work upon 39, and sent them or Washington for the inspection of he department officials. We have or hand in our office here the survey re ports on 31 townships. These we are vorking on, and will have them ready to be forwarded in a few days. Reports for the remaining 55 townships have ot yet been filed by the surveyors, although the work of all engineering parties on the reservation is finished except in the case of one party, and the ongineers are now working up their reports for filing here. On the reservation there are four parties of government inspectos, going over the work o the surveyors, and they will probably finish by the middle of November. Of actual survey work the only thing that

remains to do is to establish the boun-dary line of a section of the reservation The government entry stations have not yet been selected, although it is thought that they will be established at Price, and at Heber City. Their formal announcement, however, will made by a presidential proclamation,

when all other details are arranged.
