**Luncheon for Supervisors**—The supervisors of Salt Lake public schools are the guests this afternoon, at a luncheon given in the Lowell school where the teachers of this school are the hosts.

**Rushing the Conduit**—The westside conduit contractors are rushing things so that the west North Temple street conduit is now as far along as Sixth West street, with the excavation made nearly to Eighth West.

**Body Shipped to Tooele**—The remains of Matthew L. Reese, the Stockton miner who died in this city, were shipped today to Tooele for interment. The deceased was a native of Maryland, aged 53 years.

**Delegate to Convention**—Manager A. S. Zimmerman of Field's band will leave Sunday next for Minneapolis as delegate to the annual convention of the Federation of American musicians. He will be absent until May 25.

The bids are being checked up and the successful bidder will be announced in a few days. The implement will cost about \$6,000.

## HAIR-RAISERS FOR THE FAIR.

**Secretary Ensign Making Up a Card Of Thrillers for Utah Exposition.**

**A long list of strong attractions for October fair has been received by Secretary Ensign from the Western Vaudeville Manager's association, some of which are among the most startling ever offered here. Among those which will probably be secured for the Utah State Fair is Ce Dora, the girl of the Golden Globe. In this act two men bicycle riders and one woman rider, the latter the inside of a huge globe on their wheels, performing many stunts. In the final act Ce Dora rides thirty complete revolutions in this globe on a motorcycle, turning them inside out so that she rides from base to dome.**

**Another hair-raising act is the "Desperado's Leap." In this a man climbs to the top of a staging thirty to forty feet high, from which place he makes a headlong dive to an incline runway, which he strikes with his chest, making a sort of chute the chute descent to the end of the runway which is slightly curved, thereby making him shoot straight into the air, and landing him on his feet again, performing a flight about 10 feet away.**

**Another act is termed "Aces that pass in the air." In this two aces are pulled up to the top of an incline about 35 feet above the ground, with two women in them. When the cars are released the larger car at the two shoots ahead and striking the bottom of the incline is thrown into the air, turning a complete somersault, the smaller car at the same time shooting straight underneath it and leaving the gap. After the somersault the larger car strikes the platform immediately after the smaller car has gone. It is a preventive act.**
