NAUVOO VETERAN GOES TO HER REST

Mrs. Sarah C. Bigler Closes Brilliant Career in 93rd Year.

FRIEND OF THE PROPHET JOSEPH

Remains of Unfortunate Engineer, John F. Bliss, Sent to Texas-News Briefs.

The news of the death of Mrs. Sarah C. Bigler, at Plymouth, Boxelder county, was received by her granddaughter, Mrs. Steed, of this city, yesterday. The deceased was one of the oldest and most highly esteemed citizens of the state. She passed peacefully to the great beyond at the home of her only son Adam Bigler, death being due to general debility. Mrs. Bigler was born in Virginia and had lived to the good old age of 92 years, 3 months and 18 days. She was married to Jacob Bigler, her maiden name being Cunningham.

Mrs. Bigler was one of the early members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, joining the same at Nauvoo, and suffered the persecutions which the Saints passed through in being driven from their homes and crossing the plains to Utah. She arrived in the valleys in 1853, settling at Farmington, Davis county, where her remains will be shipped for buria. Sat-At one time when the mobs urday. were seeking the Prophet Joseph Smith and his brother Hyrum, the deceased sheltered them in her house. She was because of her kind, benevolent nature, she was faithful to her religious con-tion of "Soll Improvement." He is a woman beloved by all who knew her victions to the end. The funeral ser-vices over her remains were held at Plymouth today.
