NAUVOO VETERAN GOES TO HER REST

Mrs. Sarah C. Bigler Closes Brilliant Career in 93rd Year.

FRIEND OF THE PROPHET JOSEPH

Remains of Unfortunate Engineer, John F. Bliss, Sent to Texas—News Briefs.

The news of the death of Mrs. Sarah C. Bigler, at Plymouth, Boxelder county, was received by her granddaughter, Mrs. Steed, of this city, yesterday. The deceased was one of the oldest and most highly esteemed citizens of the state. She passed peacefully to the great beyond at the home of her only son Adam Bigler, death being due to general debility. Mrs. Bigler was born in Virginia and had lived to the good old age of 92 years, 3 months and 15 days. She was married to Jacob Bigler, her maiden name being Cunningham.

Mrs. Bigler was one of the early members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, joining the same at Nauvoo, and suffered the persecutions which the Saints passed through in being driven from their homes and crossing the plains to Utah. She arrived in the valleys in 1853, settling at Farmington, Davis county, where her remains will be shipped for burial Saturday. At one time when the mobs were seeking the Prophet Joseph Smith and his brother Hyrum, the deceased sheltered them in her house. She was a woman beloved by all who knew her because of her kind, benevolent nature, she was faithful to her religious convictions to the end. The funeral services over her remains were held at Plymouth today.

REMAINS SENT TO TEXAS.

It was decided by Judge Howell that it was necessary to hold an inquest over the remains of John F. Bliss, the unfortunate man who was killed Wednesday by the motor, the facts in the case evidencing that the casualty was purely accidental. The remains have been embalmed and will be shipped to Sherman, Texas, tonight for interment. Mrs. P. C. Volght, daughter of the deceased, lived at Sherman, and Mrs. Bliss will make her future home at that place. The deceased carried \$5,000 life insurance, \$5,000 with the B. L. E. and \$2,000 with the A. O. U. W. The members of both orders will meet this evening at Larkin & Son's undertaking parlors and accompany the remains to the depot. The bereaved widow and Engineer Cortez will accompany the remains to their destination. Mr. Cortez representing the A. O. U. W. and the B. L. E.
