#### SENATOR BUTLER'S FEES.

U. S. Treasurer Treat Restrained From Paying Them.

Washington, July 11.-An injunction as issued today by Justice Wright of he District of Columbia supreme court estraining United States Treasurer Treat from paying to former United States Senator Marion C. Butler of South Carolina \$15,000, a portion of the fee allowed for prosecuting suits against the United States and obtaining judgments in favor of the Cherokey nation.
