Editor's Note: At 12:30 P.M. today, arrangements for a meeting of the Ogden Building Association were made at the City Hall, Ogden, on all issues of the day.

A. H. NELSON MISSING.

He is accused of embezzling \$12,000 from the Ogden Building Association.

The people of this city were treated to another surprise yesterday afternoon when it became known that Alfred H. Nelson was posted as an embezzler and was actually a fugitive from justice. It was charged that he has deserted the Ogden Building Association, leaving his office as manager of the society and acting as secretary of the society.

Some time since an investigation of the books was commenced on the part of the directors, as it was suspected that the accounts of the society were not in order. Nelson was made responsible as a still hunt was being conducted on considering his affairs as manager of the society and it is said that he began making preparations to leave a more congenial climate. His house had been sold and the last bill of exchange paid on the sale was made just now and where is not known.

C. W. Westmar, president of the association, swore out the complaint charging Nelson with embezzlement, and Deputy Marshal Estlin has the warrant for his arrest. Numerous documents have been sent to railroad officials in the surrounding states and territories. At midnight a dispatch was received containing the information that a body was found near Mrs. Nelson's residence. The search was soon over and the eastern train of the Union Pacific from New Mexico, Butch, the man wanted but at present missing Nelson, has not, up to the present hour, been found.

The Nelson family moved into their hotel circle of the city, and Nelson's sudden downfall will be regretted by many who reposed full confidence in the integrity of the man.

The loss will be a considerable one, as the family has not been increased since their wife, and the horizon will fall heavily on those least able to bear it, i.e., the poor who have by dint of hard labor and frugality of living been able to lay out few dollars against a rainy day, and now the earnings of years are swept away.

A meeting of the stockholders is called for Tuesday, August 23d, in the Utah Room building, for the purpose of determining the financial condition of the association.

The 25th inst. has been set for the defendants' return under bonds or in default of which the charges preferred against them.
