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Business closed on the Mining Exchange today with the sale of 64,750 shares for \$34,946.13. An all round improvement is noticed in prices. Ajax led off with sales at \$1.1612, but it moved up to \$1.20% on the closing sale. Bullion-Beck was released at \$3.70, while Consolidated Mercur loosened up 1,200 shares at \$3.30 per share. Galena opened at 12 but failed to sustain the advance as it afterwards sold as low as 11%. Star Consolidated went up with the appearance of Mr. Packard in town. Sales were made from 57 up to 60. Boss Tweed sold up to 1978 with 20 bid at the close, while Century, of Park Valley, made a new record for itself by selling at \$1.40. Tetro sold up to 13. Sacramento was traded in at 40. APPLIES FOR LISTING.

Application of White Rock Gold Co. Accepted by Listing Committee.

The application of the White Rock Gold Mining company for a place on the Salt Lake mining exchange was accepted today by the listing commitee. Upon the payment of the regular dee the stock will be called. According o the statement made to the listing ommittee the company is incorporated for the purpose of placer mining in Centennial mining district, Elko couny, Nev., where it owns four unpatent-ed claims. The amount of gold produced prior to 1897 is estimated at \$6,000, while the actual production during that year amounted to \$1,634. The company is said to have 1.330 feet of bedrock flume in place and enough lumber on the ground to meet all de-mands during the present year. Nothing has been done for some time past, but the company expects to resume shortly. The capital stock is placed at 200,000 shares of the par value of \$2.50 W. F. Colton is named as president of the company.
