### SPENT ON RAILROADS.

Statement of Money Used in the Betterment of the Harriman System.

J. C. Stubbs, traffic director of the Harriman lines, has issued a report of moneys spent in improving the roads of the great system during the past three years. These include the Union Paclfic, Southern Pacific and the Kansas City Southern lines, All told there was Sidd,000,000 spent, but notwithstanding the fact that a huge sum was spent in cars in three years, the facilities for headiling traffic are not adequate yet. The expenditure on the various sys-tems, as set forth in the report is as follows:

Union Pacific: Sundry betterments, \$8,898,559; changes of line, \$8,690,070; new equipment, \$8,780,380; total, \$26,-265,009.

Oregon Shorl Line: Sundry better-ments, \$4,287,083; new equipment, \$3,-985,049; total of all, \$8,272,132. Oregon Rallway & Navigation: Sun-

SITE FOR EXECUTION. Sheriff and Warden Select Spot for Last Scene in Mortensen Case.

The site upon which Peter Mortensen is to be executed on Nov. 20, has practically been chosen by Sheriff Em-ery and Acting Warden Wright, Sheriff Emery has conferred with the warden Erry and Acting warden with the warden in regard to that matter and has look-ed over the various plots inside the prison walls and has decided that the execution shall take place in the ex-treme southeast corner of the inclo-sure. That spot is better hidden from view than any other inside the prison walls. The walls obstruct the view from the outside while the cell houses obstruct the view from the front. The other details of the execution have not been arranged yet. Morten-sen's fate is still in the hands of the supreme court. His second appeal will be heard by that court tomorrow morn-ing at 10 o'clock and the decision of the court will be handed down in plenty of time so that the execution can take

time so that the execution can take place upon the date set unless the court grants him a new trial.
