

## CUT HIS THROAT IN JEALOUS FIT.

Frank McBride's Double Life Results in His Being Stabbed Almost to Death.

ALL WELL KNOWN IN THIS CITY.

Two Wives Lived Within Few Blocks Of Each Other Under Same Name in Portland.

Frank McBride, who had his throat cut in a very mysterious manner in Portland, Or., on Sunday last, was well known in this city, where he was formerly assistant postmaster, and was convicted of embezzling United States funds. McBride declared that his throat was cut by a holdup, who escaped, but it soon transpired that two women, living within a few blocks of each other, claimed him for their husband, both of them going under the name of Mrs. Frank McBride. The police in Portland claim that Mrs. McBride No. 2 cut his throat in a jealous rage, upon discovery that another woman claimed to be his wife. He is now lying at the home of his wife.

This woman was named Mrs. McBride and formerly lived in Salt Lake City with McBride, and when he was arrested for embezzling United States funds here it was proven that he had spent some of the money in furnishing apartments on West Temple street for her. The other woman in the case is said to be from Davis county, and now lives at 541 Second street, Portland, Or., with her daughter, Norma. This is the one who did the cutting and asserts that she is the lawful wife of McBride, and concerning whom McBride declares he knows nothing. Though living only a few blocks apart neither of the women knew anything about the existence of the other until Sunday night when McBride was stabbed. Mrs. Frank McBride, who lives at 541 Second street, discovered the existence of her husband's double life, met him on the street, and in the quarrel that ensued cut his throat with a pocket knife almost severing the jugular vein.

McBride staggered to the home of wife No. 1, a physician was called and as the wounded man insisted that he had been stabbed by a highwayman, who escaped, the affair was hushed until Tuesday. Mrs. McBride, who did the stabbing, is a woman about 24 years old, and says she met McBride in Salt Lake City, when she lacked nine days of being 13 years old, and was married to him by the late Bishop Weller of the Third ward.

McBride is a son of Judge John R. McBride of Spokane, and a nephew of former Senator George W. McBride of Oregon.

## SPENT ON RAILROADS.

Statement of Money Used in the Betterment of the Harriman System.

J. C. Stubbs, traffic director of the Harriman lines, has issued a report of money spent in improving the roads of the great system during the past three years. These include the Union Pacific, Southern Pacific and the Kansas City Southern lines. All told there was \$104,000,000 spent, but notwithstanding the fact that a huge sum was spent in cars in three years, the facilities for handling traffic are not adequate yet.

The expenditure on the various systems, as set forth in the report is as follows:

Union Pacific: Sundry betterments, \$5,898,250; changes of line, \$3,690,970; new equipment, \$3,780,280; total, \$13,369,500.

Oregon Short Line: Sundry betterments, \$4,257,081; new equipment, \$3,955,949; total of all, \$8,213,030.

Oregon Railway & Navigation: Sundry betterments, \$2,326,698; changes of line, \$1,442,005; new equipment, \$813,579; total of all, \$4,582,282.

Under Pacific system: Sundry betterments, \$15,512,340; changes of line, \$10,132,075; new equipment, \$18,579,995; total of all, \$43,224,410.

Southern Pacific: Sundry betterments, \$20,462,218; new equipment, \$22,518,125; total of all, \$42,980,343.

Oregon & Luchi: Changes of line, \$4,400,162.

Average total of all lines, sundry betterments, \$35,974,558; changes of line, \$14,532,237; new equipment, \$36,097,143; total of all, \$86,603,938.

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## OPPOSES FRAUD AND CORRUPTION.

M. H. Walker Says Such Methods Should be Strongly Rebuked At the Polls.

GEO. LAWRENCE'S STATEMENT.

"If Any Machine Attempts to Dictate The Policy of the Party It Should be Strongly Rebuked."

Expressing himself on the present political situation, Matthew H. Walker, president of Walker Bros. bank and a lifelong Republican, is thus quoted in the Salt Lake Herald:

"I am opposed to fraud and corruption wherever it may be, whether it is within the Republican party or out of it. Any ticket which is nominated by such methods is deserving of defeat, and all good citizens, regardless of party, should do what they can to keep such practices from being permanently successful, registering their protest at the polls as well as at the primaries.

"The introduction of fraud and corruption before the convention and during the campaign for election presages the employment of such methods in the city government if the machine is successful. This cannot help being of great detriment to the interests of the tax payers and of all good citizens."

LAWRENCE'S STATEMENT.

George N. Lawrence, leader of the Republican majority in the state senate, makes the following statement in the same paper:

"I was not in the city during the primaries and conventions, and consequently do not know personally what took place, although I have been informed by personal friends of the practices. I can say, however, that I believe if the Republicans do not nominate a ticket by legitimate means, without fraud and corruption, the ticket is not deserving of support by conscientious voters of the party.

"I do not wish to be classed as a bolter, but I disapprove of any methods not strictly honest.

"I do not believe any man or clique of men or any church, should control the party, as against the entire organization. I think every Republican should have a fair chance at the primaries, and if any machine attempts to dictate the policy of the party it should be rebuked."

"I am a Republican, and expect to vote for the next Republican nominee for president."

WHAT GRANT SMITH SAYS.

Grant H. Smith, one of the leading Republicans of the city, says:

"The real issue in this campaign is whether Tom Kearns and his political methods shall dominate the Republican party."

"I am one of many independent Republicans who are in hot pursuit of the thieves."

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
