SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, that the City be, and the same is, here-by divided into five Municipal Wards, described and bounded as follows, to wit:
All that portion of the corporate

limits lying south of the centre of Third South Street, extending to the east boundary of the city, and east of the centre of East Temple Street, extending to the south boundary of the city, shall constitute the First Ward. All that portion of the corporate limits lying west of the centre of East Temple Street, extending to the south boundary of the city and

south of the centre of South Temole Street, extending to the west boundary of the city, shall consti-tute the Second Ward.

All that portion of the corporate limits lying north of the centre of South Temple Street, extending to the west boundary of the city and west of the centre of East Temple Street, extending to the north

Street, extending to the north boundary of the city, shall constitute the Third Ward.

All that portion of the corporate limits lying north of the centre of South Temple Street, extending to the east boundary of the city and east of the centre of East Temple Street, extending to the north boundary of the city, shall constitute the Fourth Ward.

All that portion of the corporate

All that portion of the corporate limits lying east of the centre of East Temple Street, between the centre of South Temple Street and the centre of Third South Street, extending to the east boundary of the city, shall constitute the Fifth Ward.
